Reflections on Sukkot

When I was pregnant with my twins, you wouldn't believe what I craved... For someone who usually strives to eat healthy, you will be even more surprised. It really wasn't something I could control. The idea of healthy food, salads, fruits and vegetables seriously sent me running to the bathroom to vomit. I couldn't even drink water sometimes. And then there were the smells...

We were living in New York City at the time. I was in my fifth and final year of Rabbinic School. Oh...and by the way, I had no idea I was even having twins until I was almost 6 months pregnant. So until that time, I thought that one baby, just one baby, was responsible for making me sick. Sick, violently ill, unable to eat. Finally when I began to feel a bit better, I felt that I might be able to try to eat French fries.

Now...for anyone who knows me at all, you would know that I don't eat French fries. I don't go to Macdonalds. I don't eat fried food...of any kind. But there it was. I told my husband that I felt as though the only thing I could keep down were...french fries.... He was pretty shocked, but he was willing to try anything. I really hadn't been eating for the first four months.

But what to drink? Believe it or not, water was last on my list. The only thing I thought I might be able to drink Was......Yoohoo... a chocolate drink. I don't know exactly what it is made up of...nor.... had I ever tasted it. It just

called out to me from the refrigerator section in our Manhattan grocery store. So there you have it. I existed on French fries and Yoohoo. Pretty crazy..pretty unbelievable! - how a person can completely change because of someone else, or in my case, someone"s"else you are nurturing inside you. I mean, think about it.. I never ate those foods before. I had the will to fight the craving for french fries when I wasn't pregnant, but totally and utterly had no power against them when I was pregnant. And Yoohoo? The chocolate drink? I actually don't even think there is milk or any other essential vitamins in it.. There is no explanation there. All I know is, that those twins, those beings growing inside me had an effect on me that I couldn't explain. The food, the heightened smell sensitivity, the physical changes, helped me understand the concept of relationships. Of how, like it or not, when we are in relationships, we change. We can't help it. Even the one who thinks they are in control and unchangeable is affected by virtue of being in a relationship. The Torah portion we read for Shabbat chol hamoed Succot. Ki Tissa. highlights this very theme. We read about Moses pleading with God to lead the Israelite people. And Moses pleading with God to let him behold God's presence. God agrees to show Moses his presence by shielding Moses in the cleft of a rock and shielding Moses with his hand so that Moses sees only God's back. My face, says

God, must not be seen. Somehow, the way God permits Moses to see Him. to experience Him without actually seeing his face, while protecting him in the cleft of the rock reminded me about nurturing, about pregnancy, and about Sukkot. Sukkot is one of these agricultural Jewish holidays you really have to dig your teeth into. The fertility symbolism of the lulay and etrog. The ancient booths that Israelites dwelt in. At face value, it really doesn't have a lot of modern appeal. Or at least, to our modern eyes, ears and minds, it might tend to feel a bit..well.... meaningless, symbols that meant something to our ancestors but that seem foreign in our hands. We are no longer farmers living off the land. And shaking the lulav while doing hakafot tends to feel a tad strange..... As if we might be reenacting this ancient ritual symbolism that used to have some meaning to our ancestors but that now, knowing what we do about meteorology, shaking the lulav seems an unlikely way to get God's attention. It seems far fetched that just because we make a sukkah, and dwell in it, or shake the lulav in it, that we would be able to affect God in any way.

But then I thought about what the sukkah symbolizes. It stands for frailty, temporary-ness, fragility.... and for total and utter faith---in God's embrace.

We all, each and every one, experienced our own sukkah for around nine months in our mother's wombs. One experience we all share in common. A time where we are ...each of us, completely a part of our mother embraced in our own sukkah.. Our own fragile and temporary covering. And when we think about how we grew, and how we slowly became more developed inside the womb, we think of our own changes. But we <u>forget</u> to focus on the changes we caused on our mothers.

So too with the Israelites. We tend to think about how God guided *us* through the wilderness.

How God protected *us* as we journeyed. How God caused *us* to dwell in booths when He brought us out of Egypt. But what about the changes we caused in God? Those who construct a sukkah or share in the joys of sitting in a sukkah during sukkot are hearkening back to the Israelites relationship with God when they were totally embraced by the divine. When they were completely dependent on eating what God provided. On going forward and resting wherever the Divine presence went forth and rested. This simple question came out of a discussion I had about whether or not these Sukkot rituals have any effect on God. And had I not made the analogy to pregnancy, I might have said, no. Because then I remembered the changes I myself went through when I was carrying and nourishing my children. The Torah portion we read on this Shabbat of Sukkot forces

us to see how Moses, and the children of Israel can effect change within God. They plead with Him, they ask for security and favor from Him. And God is actually persuaded to answer their pleas.

But how do I know that the sukkah represents a womb? The word womb in Hebrew is Rechem..meaning compassion. When Moses asks God to let him behold the Divine Presence God replies: "I will make all my goodness pass before you and I will proclaim before you the name Lord. And the grace that I grant and the compassion that I show." V'chanoti et asher achon V'richamti et asher arachem. Not only does God describe himself twice with the same word for womb, rechem/compassion, a few verses later we read on Sukkot "Adonai, Adonai, el rachum v'chanun.." a verse we chant on our festivals when we long to be once again in God's total embrace. The sukkah symbolizes this time in our lives and in the lives of our Israelite ancestors, when we were completely enveloped in the Divine Presence. This notion of losing oneself in this kind of embrace is best expressed by the Kotzker Rebbe, Menachem Mendel of Kotzk, who teaches that: Rabbi Abba bar Zabda said in the name of Rav that a person in discomfort is exempt from the mitzvah of dwelling in the sukkah.

The essence of dwelling in the sukkah is to get out of your usual, fixed dwelling place — where your thoughts usually "live," that is, what normally occupies your mind — and to lose yourself and your thoughts in God. If you truly do this, then you won't feel any discomfort, because you won't feel your own self at all, for you will have no existence apart from God. "A person in discomfort," then, is someone who has *not* lost himself in God and has *not* properly fulfilled the mitzvah of dwelling in the sukkah, therefore he has nothing to do with this mitzvah and cannot be expected to fulfill it. Based on my own interpretation of what the sukkah truly symbolizes, I understand the Kotzker's teaching regarding the experience we have of dwelling in the sukkah " you won't feel any discomfort, because you won't feel your own self at all, for you will have no existence apart from God." As one that symbolizes the nine months we spend having no existence apart from our mothers. May we all remember that the ancient symbolism of Sukkot can lead us to effect change in the world. Recalling how even when we were in the womb we caused great changes in our mothers. For if I could be persuaded to eat french fries and drink Yoohoo, surely, as you shake the arba minim, the lulay together with etrog, your thoughts of peace and tikkun olam will surely reach the Divine Presence.


