## From the Rabbi's Desk

Tzedakah is unquestionably one of the highest of Jewish values. It is commonly translated as "charity," but the English does not bring out the full meaning of the Hebrew. In the Bible tzedakah means "righteousness," while the related word, tzedek, means "justice." Both these concepts are implicit, therefore, in the use of tzedakah with respect to "charity." Giving to charity is not something to be performed grudgingly or in a patronizing manner. When we give to those in need we do so because they, in fact, have a claim on those who are better off and in a position to give. Giving to tzedakah is one of the basic obligations of Judaism, to be performed willingly and with a generous spirit.

These rules and ideals monides' famous eight degrees of were later codified by Maimonides charity. and his successors and became part of Jewish law. As a result there is a whole section of the Shulhan Arukh devoted to charity in all its aspects (Yoreh Deah 247-259). To give a few examples:

It is a positive religious obligation for a person to give as much as possible as he/she can afford. We have been commanded positively to do this many times in the Torah. There is also a negative precept which warns against hiding oneself from this obligation, as it is said, "You shall not harden your heart, nor shut your hand (Deuteronomy 15:7). Whoever hides himself from this obligation is called a scoundrel and it is as if he had worshipped idols" (247:1)

A person should give charity cheerfully and out of the goodness of his heart. He/she should participate in the grief of the poor and speak words of comfort to such a person. But if he/ she gives in an angry or unwilling spirit he/she loses any merit there is in giving (249:3).

There are eight degrees of the giving of tzedakah, one higher than the other:

- One who gives grudgingly, reluctantly, or with regret.
- One who gives less than one should, but gives graciously.
- One who gives what one should, but only after asked.
- One who gives before asked.
- · One who gives without knowledge to whom one is giving, (Continued on page 3)

## **From the President**

Dear Congregants,

As I am about to embark on being President, I want to share with you some of my history at Temple as a form of introduction.

I joined Temple Beth David in 1991 and was married at TBD in 1992. At that time Nancy and I were the youngsters at Temple every Saturday morning. Back then, we were a warm, heimish synagogue with an aging population. Sam Asher had not yet joined us, about 5 people could read Torah, and we had about the same number of families as we do now. Bingo took place at Temple on Thursday nights, and hot dogs were served at Bingo selling for a dollar.

Around that time, Annette Shapiro asked me to take over Adult Education. In 1993 I was Ritual VP. In 1994 I became President for 2 years, and my wife Nancy was asked to be Education VP. Serving Temple during 1994-95 became Nancy and my hobby. I remember each of us being tempted to answer the phone saying, "Temple". Even after we stepped down people, would call us and ask when Purim services were or when the Hannukah party started.

Early in my term. Sam Asher approached me about leading services as Hazzan, started doing it once or twice a month, and became our Cantor. Also early in the term. I deemed it important to envision where the Temple could be by the end of those 2 years. I arranged with the Board to have a half-day retreat to brainstorm elements of a vision. By the end of 1995, we had accomplished much of what we set out to do. We had developed programs and activities that created vitality and made our synagogue an attractive place. We had publicity and events at Temple that 'put us on the map', so that people in town and people who were moving to town knew who we were. Nancy, myself, and others contacted people we knew in Rochester who we thought might be a match for our synagogue, there was an open house at Temple and parlor

meetings at homes resulting in an increase over time of our membership by 20-30 families. Through education and training, the number of Torah and Haftarah readers increased dramatically, so that over 30 people can read now. The education at our Hebrew School improved, and there were more students attending. The Temple's finances were in at least break even mode. And by the time the term was over, Nancy and I were no longer the youngsters at Saturday morning services.

Since 1995, I have continued to serve as head of Adult Education and Membership (with the hiatus of 2002-2007 while I was completing a doctorate) and have aimed to assist other leaders at Temple with the functioning of our synagogue. Working together, Temple Beth David will continue to grow and develop during the coming year.

The IHSC was a busy place on the morning of November 16. Parents and children together were actively exploring some of the values that are important to Jews and that help us learn how to be our best selves. Each class presented an activity that would help visitors to the classroom learn about the value that that class had chosen to teach.

In the K/1 class people were decorating tzedakah boxes. Outside of the 2<sup>nd</sup> grade class people were learning about tikkun olam—repairing the world-- as they played a recycling sorting game. The 3<sup>rd</sup> grade presented the value of hachnassat orchim—hospitality, so visitors were greeted and made to feel welcome with snacks and the opportunity to make a welcome sign for their homes. 4<sup>th</sup> grade was teaching about the value of kedusha- holiness -by teaching various brachot that we use to sanctify time, space and eating. 5<sup>th</sup> grader s had designed a concentration

game and a bulletin board display to teach about the mitzvot that command us to treat others and the world with respect. Visitors to the 6<sup>th</sup> grade had the opportunity to play a classroom sized board game that taught derech eretz- good manners- by presenting examples of situations in which people do and do not act with derech eretz. The 7<sup>th</sup> grade transformed their room

into a theater (home to the "Pickle Players" they really like pickles in that class) and presented skits about lashon hara viewers were asked to identify the examples of "bad speech" in each of the plays. And, visitors to the Hineni teen room learned about the value of "klal Israel"- the community of Israel- as they looked at students' family trees and had the opportunity to send messages to some kids in Modi'in Israel. Parents said that they appreciated the opportunity to see what their children are learning and to visit classrooms. They even said the morning was "fun!"




