"Making Ourselves Whole Within a Holy Community"

President's Article: Imagine

As I look on the coloring leaves outside my window, my imagination takes wing. I start to picture the ways things at TBD might become...

I imagine an increasingly vibrant shul. I see our new rabbi (and others) offering new courses and Jewish experiences for adults and families. I see an exploration of the spiritual and the religious in all corners of our lives - into how we perceive and live in the world. In such experiences we might ask: How can Judaism provide a compass to our lives? I see a dynamic learning community educating ourselves about Jewish core values and applying these in our lives.

I imagine many people being involved in Temple. Without sticking our necks out and becoming involved in synagogue life, congregants will not get the benefits. So I see people being willing to create and run programs, to help the sick and needy among us, to explore how vital synagogues throughout the country conduct themselves, to serve as officers and

Board members, and to support the Temple financially and with their presence at events.

I imagine well-attended prayer services. I picture exploring the meaning of prayers and of Torah portions, maintaining traditions and innovating to create meaning and fulfillment for participants. As we continue down the road and explore the role of personal relevance and of a relationship with something greater than ourselves, a good portion of our congregants will be attending Shabbat services and holiday services throughout the year.

I imagine that congregant yearning for social action will materialize in programs. People will come forward and act on what they believe is the right thing to do to help others in our wider community. Whether it is setting up a shelter, helping our Temple become green, being a network for those out of work, or tutoring in the inner city, I see congregants stepping up and making social action at our shul a reality.

I imagine building an even closer sense of community. I see families reaching out to each other even more than they do now, building bonds through joint experiences over time. I see the same with individuals, creating friendships that might be unique in people's lives. I see an even greater welcoming spirit and caring, accepting atmoshpere permeating our shul.

Finally, I imagine congregants getting together and charting a course for our synagogue's future. I see brainstorming about what we want our synagogue to look like and setting action steps to get there. I see imaginings like those above as well as those of congregants at large.

I was driving to a doctor's office in Clinton Crossings when I spotted a sign that identified the area as a Smoke Free Zone. Upon a moment of reflection it seemed guite obvious why a section of real estate, set aside for serving the medical needs of the community, would ban smoking. By now, one would hope that most everyone knows about the effects smoking has on the health of the smoker and the people around the smoker. There is a certain symbolism surrounding the prohibition of a practice that adversely affects health in a place that is designed to restore health. Then one may ask, why is the Treasurer of the Temple interested in this or interabout it? When people visit us on Shab-

bat we are provided an opportunity to sell Temple Beth David to a prospective member. The last thing any of us should be doing is spreading any dissatisfaction we may feel about Temple Beth David or the people around us in the presence of guests. It does not make sense. It injures the spreader, the listener and, of course, the Temple.

So, let's work together to make Temple Beth David a Lashon Ha-ra Free Zone. Who knows, maybe it will spread to other parts of our lives too!



In hopes of saving money and time, we are offering two new options in regard to your temple account.

First, you may not be aware that as a non-profit organization, we are required by law to send out donor statements to each and every donor that sends in any donations in a given year. Last year, that mailing alone amounted to over 400 pieces of first-class mail. If you would be willing to receive your year-end donor statement by email instead of snail mail, please let us know. Just after January first, we will email you a statement of your account appropriate for tax purposes.

Second, we would like to offer an email billing option. This would be similar to the donor statements, except that you would receive your statement several times each year (whenever you have a balance due.) This is available for all members with an email address.

No sensitive information would be sent over the internet. For example, your social security number, credit card numbers, or any other identifying information would not be included. The only information on the donor or billing statements is your name, address, the amount and date of your donations and your balance due, if applicable.

This is an optional program. We will not start sending monthly statements or donor statements via email unless you call the office and request it. We only want to help reduce, reuse, and recycle. Hopefully, we can cut down on postage costs as well.

Please be assured that we never share any email addresses with other organizations.




