From the Rabbi's Desk

"As one thinks in his heart, so one is." Proverbs 23:7

What do you think about this aphorism? Do you believe, as Proverbs 23:7 infers, that it is possible to transform who you are or at least your perspective on life by the capacity linked to introspection and changing how you think and what you believe in your heart? Why would our tradition devote 40 days to introspection - the month of Elul and the Ten Days of Repentance – to help us make *teshuvah* (return to God's highest aspirations for us) if the possibility of personal change is a myth?

What do ancient philosophers and modern scientists teach us? Aristotle said, "biology is destiny." The multi -billion dollar pharmaceutical industry might well attest to that belief, or, alternatively, "changing biology through chemistry can change your destiny." The "nature versus nurture" debate focused on the various degrees to which heredity and environment shape personality and human behavior.

Is scientific thought, beginning with Aristotle, at odds with Judaism regarding whether or not human beings can alter our life's paths by changing how we think and what we believe? I don't think so. Science may be correct about heredity determining eye or hair color, but it is not monolithic in its findings about human intelligence. The idea of multiple intelligences and new definitions of successful living offered by scientists and psychologists lend support to Jewish belief and practices.

One of the eight kinds of intelligences accepted by current scientific thought is "intrapersonal intelligence" self reflection. When we immerse ourselves in the process of awakening to our inner thoughts and desires, we develop the qualities that help us understand our emotions, goals and motivations. Our preparation for and experience of the Days of Awe are designed for us to develop and actualize our intrapersonal/spiritual intelligence. As Rabbi Harold Schulweis puts it. "[t]he neshamah is not a computer. It is malleable and flexible because spiritual intelligence is not quantifiable, it is not a number. Spiritual intelligence grows. Faith, hope, and the respect for oneself are measured not by [the standardized tests developed by Simon-Binet or Lewis Terman but as mirrored in the image of God. They are teachable."

During rabbinical school, we were asked to prepare a personal kavannah (a text of intentionality and consciousness) to help ground ourselves before performing a lifecycle event. In retrospect, I think that engaging in this writing exercise helped us elevate "how we think in our hearts." I also believe that engaging in this type of introspective writing can provide us with a positive guideline for teshuvah (return and reconnection to our highest selves)

President's Article: For a Change

On August 8th, over 100 people attended shul at TBD as Rabbi Berg led her first services as our new rabbi. She brought a beautiful voice, a stimulating Dvar Torah, heart-felt warmth, excellent Haftarah chanting, a prayerful presence, and interesting words of introduction to the Torah portion. Services went very well, and we are off to a very good start.

And so a new chapter of change at TBD begins.

By the time you read this article, we will be in September, and the High Holidays will be around the corner. A major theme of the High Holidays is also change, a kind of turning. This "turning" at the High Holidays involves changing into someone better.

As I reflect on our congregation and the change we are undergoing as a

community, I think about our strengths and some potential changes we can choose to engage in to make us better. In reflecting on our strengths, we can envision our new, energetic rabbi and our spirited cantor. We see our participative congregation with its knowledgeable, doit-yourself flavor. We point to our history of being a hamische place with a warm, family feel.

And yet we cannot rest on our laurels. We must continue to evolve, to change, to build on our strengths. The changes I see involve expanding the pool of involved congregants and deepening the involvement of those already engaged by tapping into people's interests. I picture new people being attracted to our synagogue, as we offer more programs, activities, and social action projects. I picture

our new rabbi, eager to stretch with us, to teach and learn with us, to offer congregational dinners, and to share ideas from rabbinic school and congregations she has experienced. I also see exploring occasional innovations to our services, keeping within our traditions while trying periodic moments of meditation, personalized prayers, and ways of bringing to Torah to life. Finally, I envision an effort to grow our hamische feel (despite our sometimes hectic work and family lives) by reaching out in warm support and caring to each other, to those less engaged, to those shut in, and to newcomers.

By taking stock of our strengths and taking steps to be better, we grow as individuals and as a community. And why not continue this upward striving – just for a change?

In preparation for the High Holy Days, I urge you to write your own personal kavannah. I offer you mine as an example and an expression of how I want to be as a rabbi. I advocate that you embrace a meditation of teshuvah as you reflect upon your life, such as - "If I think standing; and believe that I can become God's highest aspiration for me. I can affect and change the way I feel and the way I act in the world."

"I call upon You, God, to open my heart, so that I may perform this holy service in Your Name:

I stand before You, God, and pray that Your presence will illuminate my

issue forth from my lips;

I look to You, God, to help me see the dignity, the uniqueness, and the preciousness of each of Your creations:

I trust in You, God, to permit me to enter the lives of those whom You love, with unconditional love and patient under-

I pray to You, God, to let the meditations of Your heart flow through this holy event and envelop the desires and fears of Your treasured ones:

I honor You, God, for making a world in which Your kiss gently transforms a moment into eternity;

neshamah, my mind, and the words that I thank You, God, for Your continual blessings and for the great gifts You have bestowed upon me - to have kept me alive, and to have sustained me, in order to perform this holy service in Your Name."

> May the ground on which we tread during these Days of Awe be holy and may we live in God's presence, learn and grow through inspired teachers, and shine our distinctive lights to harmonize spiritual and material advancement for the benefit of all humankind.

The High Holy Days (including Sukkhot and Simchat Torah) will be with us by the middle of September. A schedule of all related services is provided as an insert to this bulletin. Note, on Sat., Sept. 12 we will observe Selichot, further details as to time and location will be provided soon.

Each one of the Mincha services for Erev Rosh Hashana (Friday, Sept.

18) and the first day of Rosh Hashana (Sat., Sept. 19) will begin at 6 p.m. Since the first day of Rosh Hashana coincides with Shabbat, Mincha for that day will include a relatively short Torah service.

Also, due to the occurrence of Shabbat on the first day of Rosh Hashana, there will be no Tashlich - Tashlich will be observed on the second day of Rosh Hashana (times and locations for parallel Tashlich services [at two locations] are listed in the insert).

Kol Nidre (Sun., Sept. 27) will begin **promptly** at 7 p.m. – the building will be open at 6:30 p.m. Please note Kol Nidre will **not** include Mincha - you might wish to recite Mincha prior to your meal at home (se'udah mafseket). Also note Shacharit for Yom Kippur will begin at 8:30 a.m.

What Is Appropriate Dress for Temple?



In keeping with the tradition of Kvod HsShabbat (Honoring the Sabbath) the standard of dress at Temple Beth David requires that Shabbat and Holiday dress for all participant be *modest* and *dignified*. We cannot give honors to anyone whose attire is not in keeping with this standard.

So what is NOT considered modest and dignified enough? Jeans, t-shirts, bare shoulders, midriffs and backs, and short, tight and revealing clothes of all kinds. Women are welcome to wear dressy pants if they like.

Everyone going on the bimah for an aliyah MUST wear a head covering. Men must wear a tallit; women are welcome to wear one if they wish. Please use the side stairs to approach and leave the bimah.



Rosh Hashanah Packages for Jewish Soldiers

This High Holiday season, the members of Temple Beth David and the Jewish community in Rochester have the opportunity to help our brothers and sisters serving our nation in Iraq and Afghanistan celebrate the holiday by sending Rosh Hashanah care packages. We are seeking donations to cover the cost of sending the packages to these brave men and women.

For the second year, the members of Temple Beth David and the families of the Irondequoit Hebrew Studies Center will being sending Rosh Hashanah care packages to Jewish service members. The care packages will contain: challah, honey cakes (baked and donated by the Temple Beth David Sisterhood), grape juice, dried apples and other treats.

During Pesach, 20 care packages were sent from Rochester, most of which went to Jewish Chaplains or lay leaders to benefit large communities of Jewish soldiers. Earlier in the year, Temple Beth David sent over 150 hamantaschen to Jewish service members in Iraq and Afghanistan in celebration of the holiday of Purim. This project would not have been



possible without the generous donations of many of the hamantaschen by the Temple Sisterhood, which had baked the cookies.

These projects are just the latest in a series of efforts by Temple Beth David and IHSC in support of Jews serving our nation overseas. Care packages were also sent for the Jewish holidays of Shavous and Hanukkah. In addition to Holiday packages, Temple Beth David facilitated the donation of new prayer books to Jewish sailors serving on the USS Abraham Lincoln (an aircraft carrier involved in the Iraq War) in time for Rosh Hashanah in 2008.


