Purim - Lots of Fun!

Purim emphasizes a traditional way Jews have responded to the threat of violence -- with humor -- by making fun of the people behind it -- and by making fun of ourselves. Even though we may know that the name of the festival, Purim, means, "lots," -- for the game of chance Haman played in randomly choosing the date all Persian Jews would be massacred, we have retranslated the day into "lots" -- of something else. Like what? Lots of luck? LOL? Parking lots? The day is really about lox and there was a scribal error? How about lots of fun?



Grown-ups get to be kids, and kids get to be grown-ups, and then we all get to dress up as somebody or something else and eat lots of cookies. And there's more. A lot more. Lots of Megillah reading, lots of carbohydrate eating, lots of costumes, lots of silliness, and lots of singing.

What are we doing at Temple Beth David this year for Purim? You already know the answer. Lots! Starting off with a gourmet pancake breakfast sponsored by the Men's Club, we will celebrate all morning with a community Megillah Reading, schpiels, songs, skits, and acts -- at the breakfast, between some of the chapters of the Megillah and at the Purim Carnival. What is so great about this? We'll have lots of participation.

Take the Megillah reading. How we read the Megillah this year is intended

to honor who we are as a community - we are blessed with wonderfully-talented Torah readers, rugged individualists, and people who want to and can do things themselves. Our Megillah reading will be as participatory as possible. We also want to challenge and respond to the, at times, disempowering idea and practice of having someone else read the Megillah in 12 - 15 minutes. Sometimes it is wonderful to experience a technical virtuoso -- and sometimes it is empowering to learn a new skill, as well as discover something new about ourselves.

To avert the disaster of Jews disappearing in the Diaspora, we will actively reclaim our heritage and our legacy in an age when celebrities are royalty and entertainment rules -- by making the Megillah reading a fun and active experience by interspersing

At Temple Beth David we are very fortunate to have all of the things that we need to flourish as a community. Our building is large, comfortable, and attractive. We have space for meetings, prayer, study, and celebration. We have ample Torahs, prayer books, and other ritual objects. We have plenty of food and space to prepare it. Money is a significant challenge, but most of all, it is, of course, the human resources that are the key to our health and success.

The good news is that we have a remarkable group of people who work hard and get things done. What we need to do is to continue getting new people involved in volunteer work, projects, committees, and ultimately synagogue leadership. In order to do this, we are going to work to increase communication. Please check out our web site at tdrochester.org where you will find a new opportunities page. This page describes volunteer opportunities and has a link to another page which tells about a number of Temple work groups and committees. Please think about which of these opportunities interests you and contact the responsible person.

Terms are ending for the entire Executive Board at the end of this year including President, Secretary, and VP's of Finance, Building, Ritual, Education, and Administration. We are exploring ways to maintain an appropriate level of continuity for the next term, but it is clear that this will be a great opportunity for new ideas and new energy in the leadership of our Community. Ideally Executive Board members are selected from people who have served on the current or prior Board, but this is not a hard requirement, and we will work with anyone who is interested in providing leadership immediately or in developing skills and experience to assume a leadership role in the future.

In order to work through these topics, we have a new Leadership Development / Nominating committee getting started. Traditionally, a nominating committee has formed each summer and scrambled to fill open seats on the Board of Directors and Executive Board before the annual Congregational Meeting. We want to shift our focus from just filling chairs to helping people explore their interests and develop leadership skills

and responsibilities over time. This new committee is planning to contact as many people as possible through a combination of mail, email, and phone calls. These contacts will start a conversation about your interests and availability both in the short and long-term. Some people like ad hoc work groups that meet a few times and then dissolve. Others want to feel like they have a meaningful advisory role when significant decisions are made. And others are interested in committing to leadership roles for some time in the future when parenting, job, or other responsibilities abate. There are plenty of things to do and plenty of ways to get them done, so we are interested in whatever you can offer in terms of interests or availability. Please think about what you want from yourself and your Temple leadership, and let's get the conversation going.

CAN YOUR CAP BE RECYCLED?

The Aveda Cap Recycling program accepts caps that are rigid plastic, sometimes noted with a 5 in the chasing arrows recycling symbol. This includes caps that twist on with a threaded neck such as caps on shampoo, water, soda, milk, other beverage bottles and pharmaceutical lids, flip top caps on tubes and food product bottles (such as ketchup and mayonnaise), laundry detergents and some jar lids such as peanut butter.

KEEP THE RECYCLING STREAM CLEAN.

Some caps that aren't accepted are non-rigid lids such as yogurt lids, tub lids (margarine, cottage cheese), and screw-on lids that are not rigid. Please do not include any metal lids or plastic pumps or sprayers. Unfortunately, too much of the wrong type of materials can contaminate the recycling process. We appreciate your efforts in keeping it clean!

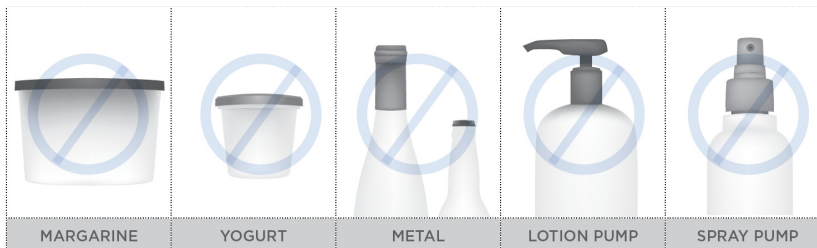

schpiels, songs, and acts between the chapters. All you have to do is sign up and do it. Read a verse - by yourself, with your family or your classmates, tell a joke, write a skit and perform it or make fun of the Rabbi (no blonde jokes, please :-). Our Tradition teaches us that during messianic times, all of our festivals, except Purim, will be abolished. Start practicing now. You don't want to miss out.

The opportunities to do mitzvot are also limitless. Included in our seven mitzvot for Purim (or four, depending on how you count them), are sending mishloach manot (often hamentaschen and at least one other kind of food) to two or more of our friends. If you didn't

have time to assemble these gifts before Purim, don't worry. There will be a table set up where you can put them together or have one of our able volunteers assist you at the Purim Carnival. We also give tzedakah to those in need (mattanot la-evyonim). Perhaps put a prutah (a coin or two) in one of our Purim pushkes after reading the Megillah.

Celebrating Purim is how we remember to forget -- that violence and fear can engulf us. We wake ourselves up by taking action -- we put our voices together and drown out the name, "Haman," the symbol of hatred and nastiness in the world. And we remember when we engage in tikkun olam, that it is in our hands, to erase it

forever. We exhaust ourselves with joy -- ad de'lo yada - until we don't know the difference between good and evil - "blessed be Mordechai" and "cursed by Haman" -- until we enter an altered state of consciousness where we can laugh at what we value most - and thereby fully accept it with all of our being.

This Passover season, the Temple Beth David community has the opportunity once again to help our brothers and sisters serving the nation in Iraq, Afghanistan and around the world celebrate Pesach by sending care packages of kosher for Passover food.

For the fourth year, the members of Temple Beth David and the families of the Temple school will be sending Passover Care Packages to Jewish service members. Last year, the Temple and the School sent 50 such packages to soldiers/sailors serving in Afghanistan, Iraq, Korea and bases in the U.S. and this year they hope to serve even more. The Passover packages contain: a Haggadah, matzos, grape juice, gefelte fish, macaroons, chicken soup and other items.

This year we are looking for volunteers to solicit donations from local businesses to cover the cost of the Pesach foods (such as gift cards to Wegmans or Tops) and shipping the



packages to Army/Navy bases on the coasts from which the Army flies them to the soldiers.

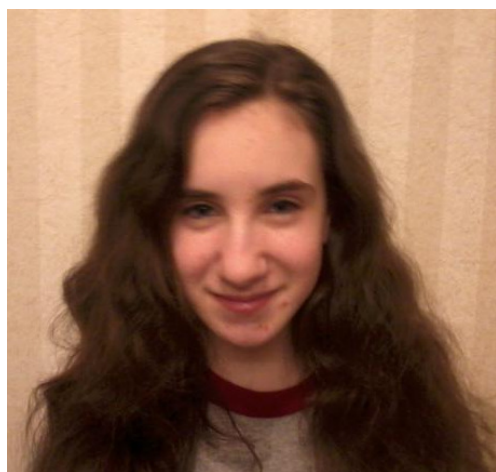
