"It is a Tree of Life"

This month, as we emerge from our Rochester winter, we begin to celebrate the vibrancy of spring, color, and new growth. Trees, in particular, are a powerful symbol of growth and development. The spreading roots anchor the tree deep in the ground as their wide branches reach toward the heavens. Trees express our longing to be grounded at the same we aspire to new heights.

Torah, in our Tradition, is "eitz hayim for those who grasp it. This verse from Proverbs is the source of the custom of holding onto the "aitzei hayyim," the Torah handles, made from trees, while reciting the Torah Blessings. When we do this, we grasp "the tree of life" both physically and figuratively before and after we read the Torah.

Our Temple Beth David community is blessed with a living Torah legacy. I am unaware of any other small synagogue whose members, and not hired Torah readers, read full kriah (the entire Torah portion) each and every week. We owe all of you who read Torah a very deep debt of gratitude for your ongoing contributions to our community.

Since ancient times, the Torah was meant to be read aloud, so that we could learn, by listening and understanding what was being read. Although several or our members are fluent in Biblical, Talmudic, and Modern Hebrew, many of us are not (yet) sufficiently fluent in Modern Hebrew to be able to understand a Hebrew conversation or in Biblical Hebrew to

follow a rapidly chanted Torah reading. There can be no question but that we are a feisty group of people at Temple Beth David. Some of us follow the reading with the English translation in Eitz Hayyim, and some of us follow the Hebrew with a finger by connecting the Torah reader's words with the Hebrew letters. We do this because it feels holy, and because it connects us with Torah and our sacred Tradition. All the while, the original purpose - listening to and understanding the oral Torah hee la'mahchazeekim bah," a tree of life reading - has become difficult for many of us to achieve.

> This was a problem even in *Tannaitic* times (from approximately 10 - 200 of the Common Era). So the rabbis authorized an official Aramaic translation of the Torah, to be recited by heart, alternating Hebrew verse with an Aramaic verse, during the Torah reading. We realized this really wouldn't help us much today, as our Aramaic is probably not as good as our Hebrew. But even if we chanted each verse in Hebrew and in English, we might have a hungry, angry, kiddushlovers rebellion as we finished up our services at 2:00 pm. Even in ancient times, prolonging the service discouraged people from participating regularly in synagogue services!

> Considering any change in our liturgy or the rhythm or substance of services is delicate. Our religious practices are very personal, and for many people, the Torah Service is the centerpiece of Shabbat morning services. Our prayers and our rituals are a combination of

At our monthly Board of Trustees meetings our Vice Presidents present items of interest for discussion and, many times, for vote by the Board. The reports generally cover finance, ritual, building and administrative issues. As always, our meetings are open to the congregation. One board member pointed out that sometimes the information is not effectively conveyed to the congregation. This month, I hope to catch you up on some interesting Temple items.

- For the past year, we have rented space in our building to an area church needing meeting space. This takes place one evening each week, and the Church members have been wonderful tenants. They take care of set up of tables and chairs, take down of these items and vacuuming. This relationship provides Temple with more than a financial boost, it fosters interfaith relationships.
- Temple Beth David should be very proud of our financial situation. Many congregations have mounting debt and fairly large operations to manage. Thanks to our Finance vice presidents past and present, we have been and continue to be debt free. Thanks to Rabbi, Maria, Marcy, Bill and our

- teachers we accomplish a great deal with a small staff. Thanks to our depth of volunteers, who provide energy, ideas and commitment for getting things done.
- For the past year, Rabbi Berg and the Ritual Committee have been discussing and reviewing modifications to our Shabbat morning services. The dream to implement changes -- after careful consideration -- became a reality this year. Two weeks ago, we began opening Shabbat mornings with Torah study from 9-9:45 a.m. Shachrit service now begins at 10 a.m., followed by the Torah and Musaf services. We also began using a Triennial model for the Torah reading. Even with the later start time, because of the shorter Torah service, we will still be able to end services at about noon.
- Our volunteers serve many areas. Our Ritual Committee has provided much support on the Bimah on Shabbat mornings, our Bulletin folding crew helps get this monthly newsletter ready to deliver to your home, and parents help at the school, while others make sure that our building and the Rabbi's house remain in good operation. So many

- volunteer activities and committees! Thanks to ALL of our volunteers and their family members who support their time on behalf of Temple.
- You often hear about BINGO and the need for volunteers. Our BINGO game at Empire BINGO is a significant fundraiser for Temple. Our volunteers make this successful and are much loved by the customers at the game. In fact, one of our security guards has commented that he will only work our Thursday night game because of our volunteers, particularly Sylvia and Bernie Roth. Thanks to everyone for their commitment to this fundraiser.

Temple life has many facets, many opportunities, and many points of entry. If you would like more information about activities at temple or information about how you can become more involved, please let me know!

heart and mind; which makes us resist
something that is so intimate and
integral to our spiritual lives. So we
proceeded cautiously and looked to the
Tradition for guidance. The original
purpose of reading the Torah blends
with one of the highest values in our
Tradition -- Talmud Torah, learning and
making Torah relevant in our lives.

There are many beautiful, as well as heart-wrenching, aspects of making an halakhic (a legal) decision that affects the community. One acceptable method the Talmudic rabbis used was called, "puk chazei," which essentially means, go out and see what the people are doing. If over two thirds of the people are doing something that is working for them, we need to take a look at that and see if it is something that might benefit our community. The concept of "puk chazei" was one of the bases on which even our earliest rabbis shortened their Torah Service.

Today, more than two-thirds of Conservative synagogues in the United States use some form of a triennial cycle for reading Torah, which means that approximately one-third of the Torah will be read publicly every year. The overwhelming advantages of the triennial system for modern congregations are precisely the same as the Jews of ancient Israel enjoyed. It

shortens the Torah Service and frees up time for additional learning.

When I was ordained as a rabbi in 2009, I was told directly, "do not suggest any changes in your new synagogue your first year, and update your resume if you even think about making any changes to the liturgy." Because we are comforted by our Traditional prayers and the familiar flow of our services, anything new or different can be emotionally disruptive. It is helpful to know that we are following a 2000 year Tradition of resisting change and then going forward with it, and by taking into account what our people are doing.

Last month, we initiated a modified form of the triennial Torah reading cycle, which we will evaluate at the end of the Jewish year, before the High Holidays. This decision, made by our Ritual Committee, took into account the needs of our community, as well as the sensitivities and deep knowledge of our Torah readers. Bernie Roth is crafting our modified triennial Torah readings based on what the majority of Conservative American shuls are doing, with adaptations that acknowledge the ascetics of each weekly Torah portion. and the skill and devotion of our Torah lainers. We are hoping that the shorter Torah readings will encourage those of you who would like to learn to *lain* (read) Torah, to take this opportunity to learn this sacred art.

Making this change in our Torah Service was accompanied by making time for increased Torah study. For those of you who would like to engage in participatory Torah study, regardless of your current knowledge level, you are welcome to join us from 9:00 - 9:45 every Shabbat morning. A little nosh will be provided to maintain our energy levels until *kiddush*. At 9:45, we begin our tefilah with *P'sukei D'Zimra* (verses of song) and at 10:00, we move into *Shacharit*, (morning prayer) followed by our triennial Torah Service, *Musaf*, (our additional service) and. *kiddush* at 12:00.

I personally and publicly want to thank the members of the Ritual Committee for their sensitivity, and wisdom in putting the needs of our community first to enhance our *Shabbat* morning study and prayer experiences. They truly kept before them the idea of "eitz hayyim hi ba'machazikim bah," Torah is a tree of life for those who grasp it.

As the trees begin expressing their new season of growth, let us ask ourselves how we might blossom spiritually, in our learning and in our lives, as we emerge into our personal spring.




Sunday, March 11 at 10:30am: Keith Freedman will give a presentation on the Jewish Soldier's Project including his week spent on an aircraft carrier.

This Passover season, the Temple Beth David community has the opportunity once again to help our brothers and sisters serving the nation in Afghanistan and around the world celebrate Pesach by sending care packages of kosher for Passover food.

For the fifth year, the members of Rochester Jewish Community will be sending Passover Care Packages to Jewish service members. Last year, 50 packages were sent to soldiers/sailors serving in Afghanistan, Iraq, Kuwait, Korea and bases in the U.S. and this year we hope to serve even more. Most of the packages are sent to Chaplain/Rabbis to serve large communities of Jewish soldiers. The Passover packages contain: a Haggadah, matzos, grape juice, gefelte fish, macaroons, chicken soup and other items.

This year we are looking for volunteers to solicit donations from local businesses to cover the cost of the Pesach foods (such as gift cards to Wegmans or Tops) and shipping the

packages to Army/Navy bases on the coasts from which the Army flies them to the soldiers.



We will continue to collect school supplies for School No. 50 — your donations are so appreciated.










