From the Desk of the Rabbi Rabbi Rachel Smookler

Midrash is three-dimensional. Last week I taught the students in our Hebrew School class the art of midrash. I showed them how if you look at the Torah and read it critically, you will find that you have some questions - and that your questions are often the same as the rabbis questions, dating back over a thousand years in some cases.

This art form of creating midrashim, stories that help us fill out our narrative, is why we have persevered. We put ourselves, our ideas, into the ever fluid storylines of our people linking us to them. In fact, the rabbis focus on one particular word in this week's Torah portion. It comes from Exodus 40:17. In the first month of the second year on the first of the month, the Tabernacle was set up. Hukam Hamishkan. The rabbis notice that the word Hukam was set up and is written in the passive form. No name is attributed to its construction. It just was set up. And so the rabbis create multiple midrashim wonderfully weaving mystical tales borne out of their own minds, on how the Tabernacle magically, through G-d's help-assembled itself.

Rabbi Ephraim Buchwald explains It is difficult to fully appreciate how special a moment it was when the Tabernacle was finally completed and began to function. Designing, erecting and fashioning the Tabernacle was clearly a physical phenomenon. The Hebrew slaves, whose only skills up until this

point had been gathering straw and making bricks in Egypt, were somehow able to fashion the most intricate furnishings of the Tabernacle, and design, weave and sew the most ornate garments for the lay and High Priests.

All this took place in the wilderness, among people who had no training for the specialized work in metal, precious stones, weaving and carpentry that was required. And, yet, with G-d's help, it was miraculously accomplished.

All the workmen, with their newly-discovered talents, and even the great Moses, could not raise up the Tabernacle to ready it for the arrival of the Divine Presence. So, G-d instructed Moses to make an extra special effort and lift the beams to place the coverings over them. When Moses' efforts failed at first, G-d advised him that a sincere effort would succeed.

That is exactly what happened. G-d helped Moses raise the beams and cover them with the special Tabernacle covers, and the Divine Presence filled the Tabernacle. It was only through the extraordinary spiritual devotion of Moses and the People of Israel that the Tabernacle was transformed from a purely physical structure into the "Dwelling Place" of the Divine Presence.

It is through extraordinary human effort that the Divine Presence is brought down to earth to dwell in the Tabernacle.

When it came time for the mishkan to be built God spoke to Moses and said, "See! I have singled out by name Betzalel, son of Uri son of Hur of the tribe of Judah. I have endowed him with a Divine Spirit of skill, ability and knowledge in every kind of craft".

In every craft, which basically meant artisan work, construction, sewing, and metal work. Things that by today's definition don't really strike us as particularly "religious".

In the second verse of this week's parsha---Pekudei, Bezalel is again mentioned as having been the one to have MADE all that the Lord had commanded Moses. Bezalel-B'tzal - El -- we have come to think of as a name. But it actually isn't a name at all. It is descriptive. It is defining. It is a state of being. B' means in, Tzal means shadow. And El is G-d. In-----G-d's-----shadow.

Think about it for a moment. Moses didn't make any of the objects that went into the construction of the mishkan. It was Bezalel. Bezalel who was filled with God's Divine Spirit. But even Bezalel and Moses could not erect the tabernacle once all the work was completed. I'm pretty sure I met Bezalel. Sometimes in my mind's eye I get confused when I know a story so well and I meet someone who so embodies the description of another. The lines blur and time seems to collapse in on itself. But, for me Midrash isn't just words on paper. Midrash is three-dimensional. For me it comes to life. So it is true, I did know a man B'----tzal-----EI, a man who lived in G-d's shadow.

Like B'tzalel--who was filled with the Divine Presence in order to construct the tabernacle and get the Israelites through the wilderness. Like I said, I know I knew such a Bezalel. His name was David Phillips.

When I first moved to Rochester three years ago and started serving Temple Beth David, I was taken by the architecture of the physical building. I was told, "Go see David Phillips". David and Florence Phillips opened up their home to me. And as I sat with them in their living room filled with mementos and objects of all shapes and sizes, I listened to the story of how Temple Beth David was erected. I heard how much time some congregants spent building that structure. And you could tell listening to David that this wasn't just any old project he had agreed to.

I honestly don't know what to say. I don't think I have ever heard such conviction and such passion, such backbreaking work, sometimes literally, when describing what a community has been willing to put themselves through in order to build their sacred space. But just as there was Bezalel in the making of the biblical Tabernacle, so there was David Phillips, of whom it will be said, G-d has endowed with a Divine Spirit of skill, ability and knowledge in every kind of craft.

I have gotten to know David and his family over the past three years and wiring for electrical wasn't all he was skilled at. Story after story teaches me that he was driven. He was a man of purpose.

But like I said, Temple Beth David, the building on St. Paul Blvd., was something special to him. And not because it was a building with four walls, not because of how much he sacrificed of his family and of his life to see that it got finished

After all that he and others did to complete it I am certain that it was transformed from a purely physical structure into the "Dwelling Place" of the Divine Presence. For through extraordinary human effort the Divine Presence is brought down to earth to dwell in our sacred spaces..

As the reality of our move and the sale of the Temple Beth David building got closer and closer, I know how terribly this affected Dave. I can only imagine how profoundly heart -broken he was. For he worked as Bezalel...In the shadow of G-d. It was almost as if the building itself became the shadow of G-d--For truly,G-d's Presence did dwell there.

As many of you know, David couldn't be there for the closing Shabbat service. It seems likely that he clung on to life up until the very last moment that the Temple building was sold, and that his soul left his body one hour prior to closing.

Because he was so inextricably tied to the building some might speculate, that in some mystical and cosmic way David would want to leave this world while Temple Beth David was still in our hands, before the papers were being signed at the closing.

But I choose to believe that the Divine Spirit that G-d filled Dave with in order for our Temple to be built never departed from him. Bezalel, in the shadow of G-d. Dave was always there. He was still overseeing things, and wanted to make sure that our beloved Temple, his beloved Temple, was transferred safely and securely to its new owners. In order that that Divine Spirit, that drive to accomplish what seems impossible, got transferred to the next generation.

Ruach Elohim. The Divine Spirit. Have you ever witnessed it? I recognized it at once in Dave Phillips when I met him three years ago. I could see his determination and conviction even though by then he was using a walker and it was difficult for him to get around. Even after he had the stroke, I could understand everything he said perfectly. As Dave was preparing to leave this world, when he was going back and forth between the hospital and the Jewish home, I saw that Ruach Elohim, that Spirit of G-d, actually transfer from Dave to those who have been so incredibly

moved, moved as if by Divine Spirit, to work day and night to see that G-d's divine cloud of Glory once again fills up our sanctuary - our portable tabernacle.

It rests over the heads of all of the officers and everyone who in throngs came to Temple Beth David to help pack up - everyone who has taken over in the kitchen, at bingo - all of us who feel the Ruach Elohim, the Divine Spirit that rests within us.

David's life came to a close just as Torah readers around the world chanted the last verse of the book Exodus: "For over the Tabernacle...A cloud of the Lord rested by day...And fire would appear in the cloud by night. In the view of all of the house of Israel throughout their journeys..."

- * Linda Servetnick for leading the cleaning out of the gift shop
- * Sue Eckhaus and Alice Nussbaum for leading the cleaning out of the school principal's office
- * David Langmann for responding to an emergency request to box up books in the Residence with Ed Drexler
- * all of the wonderful folks who showed up to clean, sort, pack, dump, and organize on many a Sunday in January and February—I hope there was some good socializing and reminiscing as well
- * and as for Helen Kashtan, Scott Davis, Ed Drexler, and Neal Eckhaus: you all expressed your commitment to the move in ways too numerous and varied for me to list here. I am immensely grateful to have worked side by side with all of you.

In addition, thank you to Rabbi Smookler for creating such a moving ceremony on our final Shabbat in Irondequoit. The moment I will remember most powerfully is when the whole congregation stood against the walls of the sanctuary and then took a step inwards to symbolize our ability to transcend any particular physical space.

Speaking of physical space.... We are now at 2131 Elmwood Avenue, and the challenge of moving out has been replaced by the adventure of settling in. We are still waiting to unpack most of our boxes, as we do not yet have access to the rooms we will use for our sanctuary and social hall. I've crafted that last sentence carefully, and unless you love to talk about occupancy rules, building codes, and loading capacity, I'll spare the rest of you the details. But based upon my last meeting with Temple B'rith Kodesh's executive team, I believe we'll be out of our holding pattern in a matter of weeks. It's taking more time than anybody expected, but it's worth it in order to get things right on the first try. I'll pass along updates as often as I can.

During this transitional time, I'm happy to report that the B'rith Kodesh chapel is serving us well for Shabbat and holiday services. Thanks to some enterprising use of carts, elevators, and disposable crock pot liners, we've been able to provide good Kiddush receptions as well. We'll continue to have use of the chapel and weekly reception space until our permanent space is ready.

I'll keep you posted about opportunities to spread the word in the community about our new location. A bigger rollout will come once our space is ready, but we are designing simple fliers announcing our presence in Brighton even before that.

While we anticipate settling in further on Elmwood Avenue, don't forget about the other places we can – and could – gather. Book groups, /giv/ and Havdalah-at-home are a few of the initiatives we already have. If you want to propose an outing, organize a gathering, or invite a congregant over to your home, I'd love to hear about it.


