#### From the Rabbi **Michael Silbert**

I look forward to the opportunity every two months to share uplifting thoughts and themes from the Jewish world with you, in this space. The joyful and redeeming aspects of Jewish life are what motivate and propel me to find meaning in it. As the rabbi of this community. I truly believe that this is a guiding charge for me. It defines and shapes the work I do with all of you, not only when we meet each other at religious services, but in our daily interactions as well - whether we bump into each other in the supermarket aisles or on the pages of this bulletin.

On this occasion. I find that I need to acknowledge that the past Jewish year which is now coming to a close, has been a particularly difficult one for Jews throughout the world, and especially in this country. We have seen the frequency of antisemitic events rise to unusual heights. There have been increased expressions of hatred, political movements focused on exclusion and denigration, and acts of violence and intimidation almost everywhere that Jews live. The inevitable outcome of these trends is death, and tragically this too has occurred. We remember the attack and ensuing slaughter at Congregation Tree of Life in Pittsburgh as a historic turning point for Jewish life in the United States

fact that not even one year has passed since that fateful morning. In fact, barely half a year had passed before an attempt at a redux, at Chabad of Poway.

Jews, like any other people, have a right to gather and to worship in peace. We have always known our congregations to collectively have an open-door policy, allowing any Jew, and any visitor for that matter. regardless of their religion, to come in and join us. This openness has characterized who we are; think of the chuppah, the Jewish marriage canopy - symbolically open on all sides as a representation of the Jewish home which should be welcoming of all guests irrespective of their origin - just as we are taught by the example set by our ancestors Abraham and Sarah.

That is why the current climate truly challenges our very identity: not only has it challenged the physical safety of some and the comfort level of many, but this recent scourge is an affront to how our entire community chooses to operate in the 21st Century. All of a sudden, doors which had always stood wide open, are now locked, and often attended by an armed guard. There are many strong feelings out there about what the right thing is to do at this time: some say that we need to heed these "wake up" calls and take the necessary steps to protect ourselves, while others question - with equal passion – at what cost to our community's character? And furthermore, they insist, can anything really be done to stop an individual who is bent on destruction and has enough armaments on them to make a militia

and try to wrap our heads around the jealous? The reality is that we're caught in the middle, as both of these perspectives represent our core values: community and survival.

> The Jewish Federation of Greater Rochester has taken the lead by being in close consultation with local police chiefs, the FBI and even the anti-terrorism unit of the Governor's office. Together with national Jewish Community security advisors, they have trained the professional and volunteer leaders of Rochester's Jewish agencies, synagogues and schools about taking steps to protect their constituents who use their facilities, and even how to respond in the event of an emergency.

> As a result of the advice we have been given by those who make our safety their number one goal, you might notice some technical changes as you arrive at our High Holiday services. Our President, Maxine Manjos, has outlined some of these steps in her column in this bulletin. Please read her comments carefully so that you will know what to expect. We ask you to excuse any inconvenience and hope you will understand that these efforts, which come about as a result of many hours of careful deliberation, are designed to keep you comfortable and safe in the knowledge that your High Holy Day experience is of the utmost importance to us at Temple Beth David.

Anyone who arrives without a Temple Beth David ticket will be respectfully screened with a wand by the security staff. Greeters have attended a training session provided by the Jewish Federation of Rochester to prepare them for the special needs of the holiday. Both your temple holiday experience and your safety have been our greatest concern.




