From the Rabbi Michael Silbert

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What you might remember about the festival of Purim from your childhood is that the tedium (for some) of listening to Megillat Esther being read is frequently interrupted

by the cacophony of groggers each time the community hears the dreaded villain Haman's name being uttered. That, and the costumes. And the hamantaschen. Mmmm – the hamantaschen...

It's an interesting holy day, and in fact, some would question whether it really is a holy day at all. For if one were to look closely at the text of the megillah, in Hebrew or English, one would notice that the festival seems to be missing any religious spirit. So much so, that the word "God" - in any one of its myriad Hebrew translations - is totally absent; it does not appear a single time! Furthermore, the story is a very concrete, thisworld account of a campaign to overturn an otherwise undocumented genocidal plot against the Jews of Persia in the second- or third-century BCE. Arguably, the only theme of Jewish religious significance present is the mention of fasting.

So, nu? Why bother?

Our Sages of Blessed Memory explored Purim and taught that although the megillah's narrative is superficial, we need to read more deeply into it in order to reveal a concealed, and therefore not immediately obvious, layer to the story. This layer is resplendent in religious and spiritual symbolism and is consistent with the story's theme of revealing that which is not at first obvious, e.g. Esther's Jewish identity, the relationship between Esther and Mordechai, Haman's true aspirations, etc. (Hence the masks and costumes which playfully conceal our true identity from each other.)

We learn in Esther Rabbah (3:10) that every mention of "king" in the story is actually a hidden reference to God, whom we also know as the "King of kings", and therefore when it is written that Esther stands before the king, we are to see an

allusion to the representative of the Jewish people standing before God. The Zohar goes even further to teach that there is a hidden connection between Purim and Yom Kippur (in Hebrew: Yom HaKiPurim = מינים.(It explains that the Ki = ָסוֹנים. nothing other than the Hebrew prefix meaning "like"; so in other words, Yom HaKiPurim really means "The Day that is LIKE Purim". And how do they justify this claim? By drawing parallels between the two: between Esther entering the king's inner sanctum to stand before him on one particular day, pleading for the lives of the Jewish people to be spared, just as the High Priest enters the inner chamber of the Holy of Holies once a year on the fast day of Yom Kippur, when he stands before God and petitions for the lives of the Jewish people to be spared.

Maimonides even taught that when the Messiah comes, even though the books of the Prophets and the Writings will be forgotten, Megillat Esther will still be remembered and hence Purim will still be observed, as testament to its importance.

The timeless relevance of Purim, as I see it, does not emanate from the idea that in every age there is someone who wishes to destroy us. No; for me, spiritual survival trumps physical survival and therefore the key message that Purim gifts to us, is: "Open your eyes! Look around at everything in your life, scratch beneath the surface and uncover for yourself the deeper meaning of your life: the reality of all your blessings, the reality of your good fortune, of each and every gift you have been given, from all of your loved ones, to the meal you just ate, to the roof over your head, to this new day."

Purim is a reminder to us – because most of us need it! – to live gratefully and to be constantly seeking and recognizing the blessings of the life we live. Come celebrate it together with us!

American Jewish World Service

AJWS was founded in 1985 by American Jews who wanted to join together as global citizens to help some of the poorest and most oppressed people around the globe. Today, AJWS is the only Jewish organization dedicated solely to ending poverty and promoting human rights in the developing world.

AJWS invests more than \$30 million a year to promote global human rights. The organization's history includes launching the LGBT Uganda Fund to help defeat the Ugandan anti-homosexuality bill.

Its programs are far-reaching and range from international earthquake relief to offering training programs in improved agricultural techniques.
