From the desk of Lewis Rothberg





The impending conclusion of my term as Temple's Vice President of Administration presents an opportunity I have always wished for, the occasion to write a love letter to the congregation. Temple Beth David has been a second home to me since I moved to

Rochester in 1996. Our children were born into the congregation, educated by the congregation and celebrated their B'nai Mitzvot with you. My mother and father were buried by our Rabbis. I feel blessed to grow old with you as we seek meaning, guidance and spirituality in Jewish learning, tradition and practice.

Three years ago at this time of year, the board of trustees was working through the tortured process of seeking a new President for the congregation. No volunteers. After some deliberation, Maxine Manjos and Barbara Grosh agreed to share the job while I agreed to take on more of the administrative and organizational functions that previously fell on the President in order to make that job more manageable. I hope that it has worked as intended but you'll have to ask them and our new President, Sue Eckhaus. For me, it's been a challenging and often humbling experience. I am grateful to so many of you for the help, inspiration, patience and education I've received. I am also grateful to Shelby who has supported me through many, many hours of working on synagogue business.

I have great respect for the commitment of my colleagues on the Executive Board and for the dedication and sincerity of Rebecca and the Rabbi who have worked through times much

more difficult than any of us anticipated. We've had to say farewell to beloved friends at the heart of our congregational life. We've felt the pain of a wave of increased intimidation and violence directed against minority communities including our own. We've endured the disruption, uncertainty and fear of a pandemic. You can imagine the many unexpected decisions we've had to make under these circumstances and we've undoubtedly made mistakes even when working with the best of intentions. In that vein, I'd like to applaud Sue and Maxine for working closely with United Synagogue (USCJ) to examine and improve our leadership processes. Little as I enjoy these formalities, they really do matter and do reflect the Jewish and moral way of doing business. Doing things in a proper and respectful way takes effort. I believe the work we have done with USCJ will serve us well going forward.

What sets our congregation apart in my mind is the welcoming nature and active engagement of our membership. One signature practice that I personally cherish is congregant reading of the Torah at Shabbat and High Holiday services. As we age and our numbers dwindle, we find ourselves at a crossroads. We have to ask the painful questions about what we can and cannot practically do. What aspects of congregational life are most important to us? Do we have the volunteer base to sustain and perhaps even grow those things? Can we address some of them with our financial resources? Our participation in formulating answers is crucial. I believe that what emerges from that conversation can be a vision of our future that we can all embrace.



Featuring Betty Baker's "Flight to the Goldeneh

A fictionalized account of the author's mother-in-law's tale. Fagela Rivka had been just 12 years old on arriving on Ellis Island with a sign hanging from her neck that read "Fanny Jacobs, Rochester NY," which was to be her new name and home. What crises had led to the girl's solo departure from Lithuania? What must that arduous journey have entailed? But it is also true, for the stories are a quilt of the very real experiences of her Jewish immigrant parents and her many relatives - the mishpocha - living on Joseph Avenue in the 1930s. Betty Baker (z"I) and her family were long-time members of the Temple Beth David family.

Gates of Everyday Holiness: An Introductory Course on Mussar with Howard Brill and Liz Ornstein

Mussar is an ancient Jewish tradition of spiritual practice. It is not philosophical or mystical but emphasizes the practical aspects of being a better person, a mensch. We study character traits (middot) such as humility, patience, order, truth, and trust. Participants will discuss and keep journals of their experience with each middah (character trait). All are welcome, whether you've just heard of Mussar or you've been practicing for some time. The group will meet every other week, and members will meet in pairs (chevruta partners) on the alternating weeks.
