There are religious developments currently unfolding around us that demand our attention, and they masquerade behind the quise of abortion rights.

So let's begin with abortion. Does Jewish law permit abortion? Yes? No? The answer is a definite "it depends" on who you ask.

If one were to ask the question in the Haredi corner of the Jewish world, the

answer for the most part is "No." Mainstream Orthodoxy is somewhat divided over the issue with the Israeli Chief Rabbinate seeing it as a "lesser degree of murder", but that's not where the discussion ends. There also are numerous nuanced Orthodox It's a terrifyingly slippery slope, which should lead all of us who opinions about its permissibility in cases where there are complicating circumstances, such as risk of health to the mother, anticipated birth defects, illegitimacy of conception (e.g. rape and incest) and numerous other compassionate considerations. Therefore, while some Orthodox leaders have aligned themselves with their counterparts among the Christian right-wing on this and other issues, the Orthodox Union (OU) said in a recent mobilizing on this one. statement:

"Jewish law prioritizes the life of the pregnant mother over the life of the fetus such that where the pregnancy critically endangers the physical health or mental health of the mother, an abortion may be authorized, if not mandated, by halacha and should be available to all women irrespective of their economic status... Legislation and court rulings — federally or in any state — that absolutely ban abortion without regard for the health of the mother would literally limit our ability to live our lives in accordance with our responsibility to preserve life."

There's a lot to unpack in this excerpt. While the OU does not frame their conditional support of abortion in the language of "women's choice", there are some very important issues here which - I believe - should speak to all American Jews:

In the opinion of most American rabbis (i.e. many main-1. stream Orthodox as well as most non-Orthodox), Jewish law permits abortion in certain circumstances.

Not only does it permit it, but it mandates it. 2.

Implied is that the understanding that life begins at 3. conception, is informed by Christian theology. It's not Jewish and it certainly is not universal.

4. An absolute ban on abortion would make it impossible for

Jewish women to comply with Jewish legal opinion.

5. Aside from Jewish women, others who seek abortion for the same reasons that Jewish law considers valid, would be prohibited from pursuing this course of action.

have many concerns about the (anticipated) revocation of Roe vs. Wade. But larger than the issue of women's rights

is my dread of the role that conservative, right-wing Christian doctrine is being awarded, which undermines our democracy in a country that apparently does not have an official religion.

are being coerced under the authority of a particular brand of Christian belief, to ask: What's next? Employer health insurance no longer being required to cover prescription contraception? Check. (Actually, that decision by the SCOTUS precedes the abortion ban redux, thanks to Hobby Lobby's activism.) A ban on the sale of over-the-counter birth control? Texas is already

And then? How long before religiously motivated objections are raised to rights like circumcision or shechitah (kosher slaughtering), as has happened in some European countries? This may sound extreme, but I hardly need to remind you that when Jewish fates have depended on the mercy of conservative churches, it has not been a pretty picture. This is precisely why America has for the most part been such an exceptional haven for us. Our success here has depended on the democratic and areligious nature of this country. It is largely because we have enjoyed the freedom to live according to our religious convictions and have enjoyed the "ability to live our lives in accordance with our (religious) responsibility" (Orthodox Union) that everything else has fallen into place to make our life as Jews in America so successful.

The Orthodox Union has illustrated for us how this has already begun to change. Abortion, voting rights - you name it - are but the writing on the wall for what is yet to come.

We need to live with eyes wide open and be willing to be vocal and active in the preservation of American democracy, for in addition to abortion, that is what is at stake.

The mission of Temple Beth David is to provide an environment where the concepts of community prayer, education, and service to the greater Jewish community are provided within the context of Conservative Judaism. We take pride in being a friendly, participatory, egalitarian community, welcoming all to be a part of our synagogue family.


