#### From Rabbi Michael Silbert

Judaism is about hope and the rest is all commentary (though we should still learn it):

#### Example #1:

The Torah opens with the Jewish parable of the creation of a universe for us to inhabit, in which we are encouraged to grow every single day of our

lives, fulfill our potential and develop meaningful connections. The expectation at the outset is that we *will* succeed; there is no mention in the narrative of any trepidation about our outcome.



When a Jewish child is born, the nature of the primary connections that we should aspire to in life are articulated in a prayer for the newborn:

May this child be raised to enjoy the blessings of Torah – may they develop a deep and meaningful connection with God;

May this child be raised to enjoy the blessings of chuppah – traditionally this projected the hope that the child should one day get married. Now that we live in a somewhat more complicated age with respect to personal relationships and gender rights and autonomy, we expand this to encompass our hope that the child will develop a deep and meaningful connection with another human being who is to them unlike all other people – their soulmate;

May this child be raised to enjoy a life of ma'asim tovim, good deeds — may they develop a deep and meaningful connection with their community, with those around them, ever sensitive to their needs and with a drive to make life better for others.

Here too, this prayer offers no hint of anxiety that things might go wrong and these aspirations might get derailed. Interestingly, there's also no mention of careers, income, awards and fame. Only the



really important stuff is listed humankind's loftiest achievements which engender spiritual meaning, personal joy and the dignity and wellbeing of others. And there's a quiet confidence that all of us will get there, in our own unique way.

There are countless other examples we could turn to as

prooftexts that Judaism is preoccupied with the positive, but the fact that these two projections of a life grounded in hope are so very foundational, resonates powerfully for me.

At the same time, it would be foolish to deny that pain, suffering and failure are inevitable aspects of our human experience. Yet our faith and tradition do not instruct us to become used to them; rather they seek to imbue us with tools to overcome them, and even to express our rage towards God when the situation demands it. As Jews, we are permitted, even entitled, to shout our frustration and desperation to the Heavens.

And then, as the days begin to get cooler and we approach the High Holy Days together with Fall's gradual arrival, we are reminded that the opportunity to begin all over again, draws near. Judaism asks us the question: "What if the past didn't matter and you could hit the "reset" button?", and then it <u>delivers</u> this implied gift of renewal to us (although it does require work on our part too).

Life without the possibility of growth and developing meaning and connection would be unbearable. This is why Jewish life invites us to pursue these blessings every single day. By the time this reaches you, it will be less than a month to go before the New Year, which means that NOW is the time for each of us to decide what we're going to do with this gift of renewal, and what hope will look like next year.


