#### From Rabbi Michael Silbert

When I was a kid, I used to find sitting in synagogue excruciating. I didn't have much say in the matter as my parents expected me to attend and once I was there, I wasn't allowed to hang around outside with the other kids. Oh no - I had to be *inside*. My father would try to sweeten the deal by



bribing me with candy - though not on Yom Kippur - and this was a fairly successful distraction, at least until I'd finished them all and had to return to confronting just how boring our liturgy could be!

Back in those days, sitting in services was about as engaging for me as listening to someone read the phone book for a few hours on end.

One year my older brother whispered in my ear: "Hey! Look at this!", as he pointed out the "Unetaneh Tokef" prayer in the machzor (the High Holy Day prayer book), his finger closing in on the line: "On Rosh HaShanah it is written and on Yom Kippur it is sealed... who will live and who will die..."

This absolutely freaked me out! In an instant, the Jewish High Holy Days were transformed from a benign but boring New Year celebration into an apocalyptic nightmare, with visions of God about to smite us all at any given moment. Ten days later as Kol Nidre night approached, the anxiety had taken such a hold of me that I couldn't even bring myself to eat dinner before the fast. Zero-hour was nigh!

Thank goodness I outgrew that stage. Firstly, because not eating before a fast can make the next 24 hours even more arduous. And secondly, because Jewish liturgy, much like Torah, lends itself to being understood and interpreted

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at numerous levels of depth, to the extent we that actually take it literally at our own peril.

I get the feeling that my youthful misapprehension of the High Holy Days as this "live or die, survive or suffer" moment is something that many of us hold onto way into adulthood

and even throughout our entire lives. It is something that I suspect makes many Jews reluctant to attend services or to even participate in Jewish religious life at all. The flip side of this is would be a compulsion to attend, "just in case" - as a type of insurance policy in case it's true.

Truth is, I simply no longer believe that aspect of Jewish tradition which historically has been imposed upon us by a single *piyut* (Jewish liturgical poem), composed in 11<sup>th</sup> century Germany. And I'm not alone: Sephardic Jews don't even include it in their worship! If anything, it's a footnote - an optional extra - that sleeps quietly at the back of their book, if it's even there at all. In other words, an entire philosophy or theology which has made so many of us Ashkenazi Jews so uncomfortable for so long, doesn't even feature in the High Holy Day thoughts of half the Jews in the world!

Instead, emphasis is placed where it belongs: on our *spiritual* survival and success, on seeking to strengthen our personal relationship with God for another year and on emphasizing the hope that the New Year will bring us an even greater sense of connection to our Creator.

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The mission of Temple Beth David is to provide an environment where the concepts of community prayer, education, and service to the greater Jewish community are provided within the context of Conservative Judaism. We take pride in being a friendly, participatory, egalitarian community, welcoming all to be a part of our synagogue family.

### Donations

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And regarding my childhood boredom with the service, which many of us also carry deep into adulthood, here's a suggestion my father used to make to me: bring something to read. Seriously. If you typically have a hard time staying in services, then bring a meaningful Jewish book along and use that as a vehicle to connect with your people and with questions about what it means to be a Jew.

For years I've been following a leading American Jewish thinker on Facebook, who at this time of the year asks his friends: "So what will you be reading in shul this year?" I find it both amusing and extremely informative to see the responses from Jewish academics and communal leaders, Conservative, Orthodox and Reform, which give insight into the latest titles and ideas taking root in Jewish life and learning.

It turns out that my father was really onto something.

The bottom line is: now that we need no longer be as fearful of COVID, let's neither allow our fear of some of the scary themes of this season get in the way of us showing up. Let them go. Come join us, seeking joy and something meaningful to LIVE by.

And afraid you might be bored? Then bring a book. Seriously.
