From Rabbi Michael Silbert

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70 is one of the most auspicious numbers in Jewish tradition. Among other famous 70s, are:

70 Nations and Languages: The Torah lists 70 descendants of

> Noah after the flood and explains, "These are the families of the sons of Noah... the nations were separated on the earth after the flood."[Gen.10:32]

> Our sages drew from this that humanity comprises 70 nations, each with its own language. While today we understand the number of nations and languages throughout the world to be considerably greater than 70, the notion of 70 Nations and Languages has long described the Jewish People's awareness that we live in a complex world where we are not the only people created by God, living under God's sky. Humanity includes all of us.

- **70 Elders:** God tells Moses to gather 70 Elders of the Israelites to join him part of the way up his initial ascent of Mount Sinai to receive the Torah [Ex.24:1]. Later, the Rabbinical Court (the Sanhedrin) would have 70 judges plus 1 (representing Moses himself). Therefore, we see that the Jewish pursuit of holiness and justice is not monopolized by a single leader, but is shared among the people, ensuring that it is a communal endeavor.
- 70 Faces of Torah: A midrash expounds that since Torah is so profound and can be understood at so many levels, there are 70 valid ways of understanding and interpreting Torah [B'Midbar Rabbah 13:15].

Again, this number 70 – whether we choose to understand it literally or metaphorically expresses a fundamental Jewish belief that there ought to be a plurality of perspectives with regard to Torah and life itself.

- 70 Holy Days: Another *midrash* calculates that there are 70 Biblical Holy Days - and causes for celebration! - in a year [B'Midbar Rabbah 14:12].
- 70 Full Years of a Person's Life: A complete human life is said to be 70 years long [Psalms 90:10].

Pop quiz:

Q: At what age does a person's "second Bar / Bat Mitzvah" occur?

Upon reaching the age of 83 i.e. 70 + 13 **A**:

For all these wonderfully positive reasons and more, 70 is a highly feted number in Jewish life and teaching, representing myriad possibilities and opportunities for growth, learning and sanctity. Therefore, 70, more than most other numbers and ages, is a milestone most deserving of celebration.

What an amazing opportunity it is then for all of us to be part of Temple Beth David's 70th anniversary this summer! As we look around and notice the changes in Rochester's Jewish communal landscape over recent years, we should not only be grateful that we've reached 70 and are still going strong, but each and every one of us should be PROUD to have contributed in our own way. Together we have built and sustained a "Kahal Kaddosh" - a holy community - each time we've shown up, each time we've celebrated lifecycle events in our own families or of our friends and relatives. Even each time we've come just to help make a minyan in case a total stranger has needed to say Kaddish, has been a holy moment in the life of our congregation.

Imagine, then, if we could add up every single time someone walks through our doors to join us in

The museum is dedicated to keeping alive the stories of the 982 refugees from World War II who were allowed into the United States as "guests" of President Franklin D. Roosevelt. These refugees were housed at Fort Ontario in Oswego, NY, from August 1944 until February 1946.

On Friday, July 12, we had the pleasure of spending a morning with **Bernie Roth**. This gave us the opportunity to ask him about his life's path, accomplishments, relationships and in return, we received his wisdom.

Bernie was born in Allentown, PA. Sadly, his father died when Bernie was 10. His mother came to this country as a teen. With her, she brought a Yiddish/Hebrew siddur and that siddur is now in the hands of a great-granddaughter. Bernie attended a JCC Hebrew School Monday through Friday, after school and Sundays, where he was immersed in Hebrew instruction. After Shabbat services, he and his friends studied with the only rabbi in town. Bernie believes that he stuck with this schedule because his friends shared his interest in learning.

At age 17, Bernie enlisted and went into the reserve corps. At 18, he learned radar repair. He was in the U.S. Army from 1942 to early 1946.

Bernie attended the University of Maryland where he earned a Master's Degree in Physics. While there, he met **Sylvia**, who was working at the university hospital. The two married in 1949. After completing his degree, Bernie was offered a job at Eastman Kodak. Sylvia was not able to leave her job quite yet, so Bernie came up to Rochester and resided at the downtown Jewish Young Mens and Womens Association. Bernie



and Sylvia met on occasional weekends in Williamsport PA, which was half way for both.

Bernie was a Research Physicist at Kodak for 35 years. He was the fourth Jew to be hired as a researcher there. However, there were a handful of other Jews employed by Kodak in other departments. Once a month, a rabbi came and led discussions over lunch with all of the Jewish employees.

When Sylvia joined Bernie in Rochester, they lived in an apartment until they found their home on Northfield Drive in Irondequoit. This was in 1954 and they had a choice of two shuls to join — Temple Beth David and Temple Emanu EI. They chose to be members of Temple Beth David. Soon, their son Michael was born and Rabbi Solomon performed the B'rit. After Michael, Bernie and Sylvia had two more sons, **Bruce** and **Joel**.

Bernie was quickly hired as a Sunday School teacher at the temple. He was soon moved up to the position of Hebrew Education Chair, where he was in charge of hiring teachers for the Hebrew School. Bernie shared that during Rabbi Solomon's tenure, he was a member of the synagogue choir which performed during Friday night services.

Initially, Rabbi Solomon taught all Bar/Bat Mitzvah students and read the entire Torah portion every week. When he retired, Bernie began taking on these responsibilities. Over the years, Bernie taught the Bar/Bat Mitzvah students, the confirmation class, and led the Junior Congregation. Bernie studied on his own to learn to chant Torah and mastered both the regular trope and the alternate tropes chanted on holidays.

Bernie and Sylvia were active participants in the social activities at Temple Beth David. And there were plenty of them: Picnics, Casino Nights, Bingo, Sisterhood Donor dinners, and Men's Club breakfasts. **Morris Herman, Sue Lederer's** father, wrote several plays and Bernie was always one of the actors.

Bernie has 14 grandchildren. He is fortunate to have 21 great grandchildren and some great greats as well. Some of his progeny have made homes in Israel, and he has traveled several times to visit them. Bernie still resides in his own home while in Rochester, and spends several months a year in Florida with Michael and his wife, Laura.

Upon reluctantly gathering up our things to leave, Bernie noted that when you join Temple Beth David, you wonder, "What can it offer me?" But then soon you realize "What you can offer in return." It's a reciprocal arrangement.

Thank you, Bernie, for enriching our lives by offering so much of yourself to TBD.




We bereby share the nachas of our recent graduates. Mazal Tov to those who did the hard work, and to their kvelling parents too!
