We Are Not Alone

I was weighing some pears in the supermarket a few days ago (D'anjou, if you must know) when a complete stranger tapped me on the shoulder, smiled warmly and said: "You are not alone."

Honestly.

In rapid succession, I went through this progression of thoughts:

Is she getting impatient that I'm taking too long with the produce scale?

Is she following me?

No, wait - she's noticed the *kippah* on my head! Israel...

Resolution of a fleeting mystery: I realized she'd seen my *kippah* and was making a comment to me about Israel. Decoded, "*You are not alone*" meant she could tell I was a Jew and wanted to let me know that she shares my concerns for Israel and the Jewish people at this difficult time. She's not the first non-Jew to tell me that recently. Over the past few months, we've had a number of guests come to services to show their support and family friends also have reached out to us; our neighbors; teachers at our kids' schools; the real estate agent who sold us our house!

However, in contrast to these messages, as Israel has pursued its campaign to rout Hamas from Gaza following the October 7th massacre, the din of critical voices rising even more steadily comes as no surprise.

As soon as we heard the initial reports on that fateful Saturday morning, I had the sense that even before Israel launches a response, it's already caught between a rock and a hard place. On the one hand, they have endured an attack of unimaginable brutality

and gruesomeness, yet much of the early expression of sympathy would likely not last long, for as soon as Israel would join this war it did not start, it would inevitably come under a barrage of condemnation from the rest of the world. To paraphrase the title of Dara Horn's book, "People Prefer Dead Jews", sometimes it really does seem that the world feels much more comfortable with Jews who die than with those who survive. Damned if we die and damned if we don't.

At the same time, just because Israel's detractors reflexively accuse her of disproportionate retaliation, doesn't mean it never happens... It took only a few days for the terrifyingly ambitious goal of wiping out Hamas to be announced. The longer the war continues, the more fearful I become about just how achievable this is, at least without causing total and utter devastation in Gaza. And yes, we *should* feel that we have a stake in the wellbeing of Gazan civilians for numerous reasons: political, human, even *Jewish*.

After all, who among us has failed to learn the lesson around the Pesach Seder table about not rejoicing when God's Egyptian children suffered from the plagues? Is there any Jew who defiantly refuses to remove those 10 drops of wine, unwilling to diminish their joy at our enemies' demise as our tradition teaches us? Our stomachs ought to turn when we see the daily images of dust-filled flattened cities. How will we know when the last Hamas killer has been killed? How many dead and displaced civilians are enough? When does it become too much? On the other hand, the Seder never teaches us to submit to our compassion by surrendering to our enemies so that they can kill us and be victorious instead of us. Putting our own nation / families / children / selves first in a war situation is a moral choice

BOARD OF TRUSTEES / OFFICE

While most of our temple Board of Trustees remains intact, **Cindy Halpern's** term has ended. We thank Cindy for her participation on the Board and for her continued work with the Ritual Committee. **Marc Lande** has been elected to a three-year term on the board and **Judy Fleissig** and **Scott Bauman** have been elected to another three year term each. Thank you to all the Board members and Executive Board members for their efforts this year.

Our move to Temple Beth El was the biggest change this year, followed closely by the need to hire a new office manager. We are thankful to **Misael Colon** who continues to help us several hours a week while we are searching for a permanent replacement.

ACTIVITY COMMITTEE

In October I convened the first Activity Committee meeting with several congregants in attendance. We discussed the genesis of this committee:

- There was a recent Board discussion about *tikkun olam* in the form of donations the Temple was giving to other non-profits in Rochester and whether we should express *tikkun olam* in a different manner — such as volunteering time in community not-for-profits;
- There has been a request for the Rabbi to teach classes for the congregants without any specific topics developed.

Our move to Temple Beth El has introduced the opportunity to collaborate in various areas of temple life. In the hope of getting more involvement of congregants, I placed *tikkun olam*, social events, and education under the rubric of an Activity Committee.

One of the events that brought the most excitement was the 70th Anniversary celebration of the Temple in 2024! There were several ideas of how we can celebrate this event. This most promising is to combine the celebration with our well-attended annual picnic. A performance of the Rochester Jewish Cho-

rale appears promising. Please contact me if you want to join the planning for this event.

We also discussed visiting the Safe Haven Holocaust Refugee Shelter Museum (in Oswego) covering a very current topic.

COLLABORATION

I recently received information about Temple Beth El's Strategic Plan that is outlined below:

Preserving and Advancing Conservative Judaism in Rochester

The mission:

- Create and sustain an environment where Conservative Judaism is celebrated and shared among a diverse, inclusive and engaged community
- Learn how congregants want to observe, celebrate and embrace our faith
- Carry out the promise of the Farash Foundation grant by working to engage congregations sharing Temple Beth El building space, including clergy and leadership
- Honor the history of all congregations sharing Temple Beth El building space now and in the future.

This plan has facets that include Temple Beth David as an important player in this Conservative Jewish campus. I am our Temple's representative in their strategic planning task force. In a December 17 meeting there was much discussion about what makes a Conservative Jewish community. More meetings of the task force are planned for the new year.

Another point of cooperation is occurring now through the end of February. Rabbi Bitran El will be on sabbatical and Rabbi Silbert will be filling in for him for lifecycle events, as needed. The Temple Beth David Board and Rabbi Silbert have also agreed for Rabbi Silbert to lead joint Shabbat services six times in the Temple Beth El sanctuary through these two months with the intervening services in our chapel.

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LOOKING BACK: Temple Beth David 1953-2023

Throughout 2024, *The Bulletin* will feature information about Temple Beth David over the decades in celebration of our 70th Anniversary. Much of the following comes from a publication prepared by the planning committee for our 50th Anniversary celebration; some comes from the Temple archives. Thank you to **Alison Helms, Sue Lederer, Bernie Roth**, and others who have been saving items of historical interest in the our Archives since 2004.



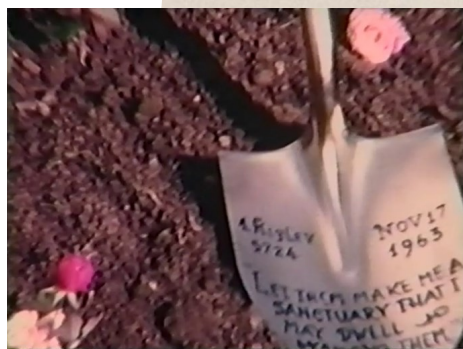
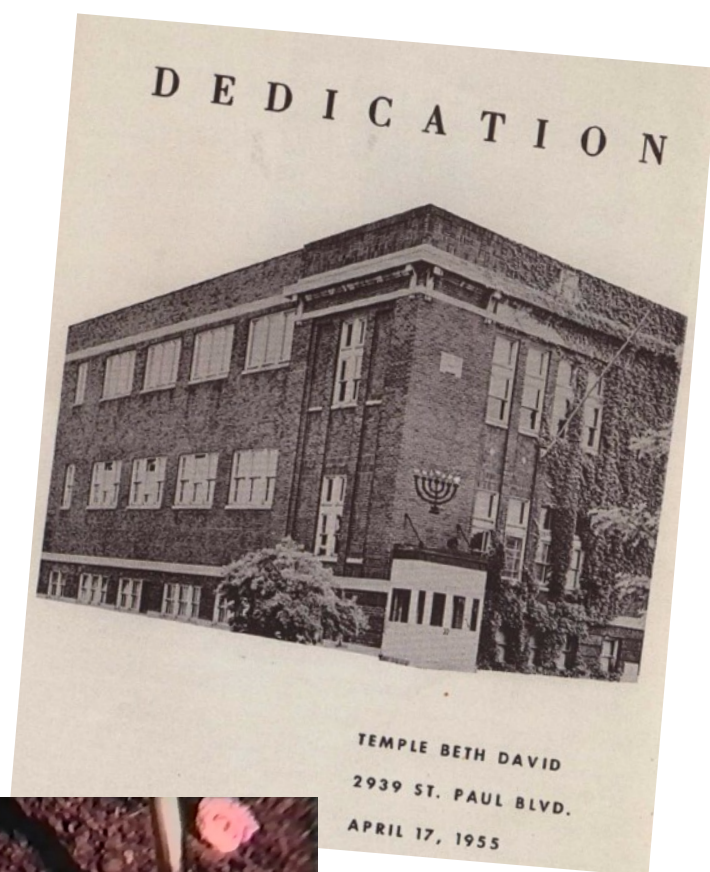
On October 30, 1953, a group of Irondequoit Jews informally met and made a historic decision to form a congregation. The fact that there was no sanctuary, finances, spiritual leader or any other manifestations of a synagogue did not deter these determined individuals from holding Shabbat evening services just three days later in the rented basement of the old Grange Hall — a building later occupied by the venerable House of Guitars.

Six days later, more than 100 men and women gathered to endorse the idea of creating a Conservative congregation. Fifty-three families immediately joined. The Congregation's name was chosen to commemorate the 3,000th anniversary of the founding of the Temple in Jerusalem by King David.

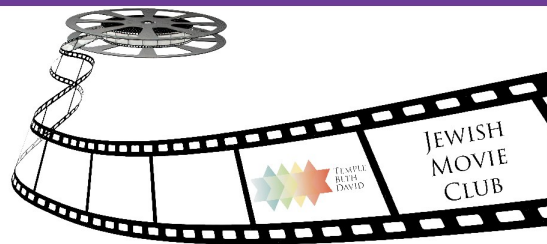
Within weeks, Sunday and Hebrew schools were also established...

...In May 1954, negotiations were initiated to purchase the Unity Recreation Hall at the intersection of Titus Avenue and St. Paul Boulevard....As membership expanded, it soon became evident that the Temple's first home would not be its last. Unable to expand the building on the existing property, a search was initiated to find a suitable site.

A groundbreaking ceremony was held in November 1963 for a new building at St. Paul Boulevard, large enough for the 300+-member congregation, containing a sanctuary, social hall, and classrooms. The actual construction of the building - a slow and difficult process - was completed by November 1, 1969, thanks to the dedicated hands-on work of many of our founding congregants.

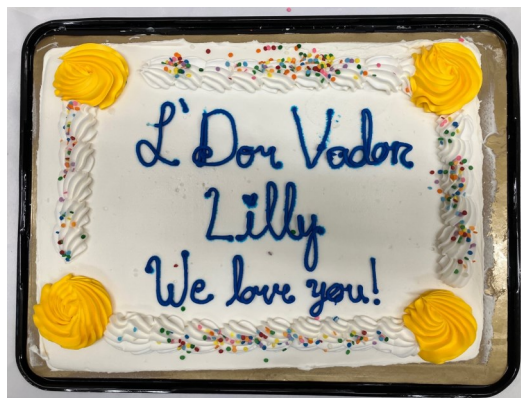

that's easily justified. Besides, who among us has failed to learn the lesson of the Holocaust that when our enemies pledge to get rid of us – not make peace with us, but eliminate us – they usually proceed with alarming resolve?

There is no way that the leaders of Hamas are surprised by a response of this magnitude. They know Israel too well. Even as their own people's suffering increases by the day, they continue to coax Israeli aggression further by promising that October 7th is but the first act in a long playbook. I proposed in a sermon shortly after that day which will live forever in infamy that the aim behind Hamas' series of strikes over the years has never been to conquer Israel outright, nor is it in their own people's best interests. Rather, it's a protracted, decades-long campaign aimed at ever increasing escalation itself, thereby luring Israel into ever stronger reactions, resulting in an unstoppable hemorrhaging of Israel's legitimacy on the world stage. It's a slow path to *Judenrein 2.0*.

Hamas' leaders seem to be placing their money on predicting a long-range outcome that –while it might cost many Palestinian lives in the interim – Israel cannot survive forever without friends and support. Current polls which show President Biden's diminishing favorability among members of his own party because of his dogged loyalty towards Israel would appear to be just the kind of short-term development that Hamas hopes for. Furthermore, have you been following developments at the International Court of Justice in the Netherlands? That crumbling sound you hear is the daily erosion of Israel's reputation.

At the time of writing in mid-January, 11,000 rockets have been fired from Gaza into Israel *since* October 7th. Some of these were even fired in the very moments that South African lawyers held the floor in The Hague, accusing Israel of genocide. More than 100 hostages are still being held in Gaza. **MORE THAN 100 HOSTAGES ARE STILL BEING HELD IN GAZA!**

Clearly, our enemy is still actively at war with us after breaking a ceasefire in place until October 7, so what then is Israel supposed to do? Initiating a ceasefire seems absurd to most Israelis when Hamas is still bent on their destruction. Furthermore, the irony that people around the world are calling for

a ceasefire from Israel without any preconditions of Hamas' release of the remaining hostages, only drives home the point to Israelis that few are interested in the plight and victimization of both sides.

Which brings me back to my new friend – the one I met at in the fresh produce aisle. Against a backdrop of Israel's war as well as rising antisemitism throughout the Diaspora, it is easy to succumb to despair and to feel that we are alone. There are times when I ask myself if I'm going crazy, or did others just not see – in real time! – what happened on October 7th? And if they saw it, how have they convinced themselves to summarily dismiss it, or even to suggest that the video footage might have been fabricated by Israel? How does one wrap one's head around the audacity of denying what we have all seen with our own eyes? The relationship between the truth of these events and its deniers is no different to what we experienced on January 6th, 2021, in Washington DC, or dare I say with denial of the Holocaust. When what we all saw happening live is denied, history ceases to exist. Nothing is provable anymore. These deniers might live among us, yet they do not live in the same reality that we do and they do not uphold the same fundamentals of the civilization in which we live. No wonder so many of us feel so alone.

Despite this, arguably we are less alone than we've been in the past. Widespread hatred of Jews and designs to marginalize and even destroy us are nothing new. But I cannot imagine that in times gone by when tyrannical plots against us have been hatched, that so many others have come out in our defense.

The Jewish People has never won any popularity contests. Especially in modern times, getting by in the margins can feel too difficult for many Jews to contend with compared to the alternative of unburdening oneself of this yoke and disappearing into the majority. But living with a mission is not necessarily meant to be easy. For that is who we are and it is that same mission which also brings joy and meaning to our lives. Together we have something wonderful and I'm glad to tell you that in addition to each other, we also have friends out there. We are not alone.
