The birthday of an ailing loved one can merge the sense of celebration with uncomfortable uncertainty: while indeed we are grateful that they've reached this momentous



occasion, it can be difficult to allow ourselves to be fully present in the moment and not let our thoughts drift off to sadder places. What will the next year hold? This is where my head was on Yom Ha'atzmaut – Israel's 76th Independence Day, last month.

It shouldn't be news to any of you that this year's was a somewhat muted celebration. It's interesting to think of Israel as a Jewish person who during the first year of mourning for a close family member, does not publicly engage in parties and frivolity. And even for those who do not follow these aspects of Jewish law, how many people *wanted* to – how many were *able* to – celebrate, what with around 130 of their children or neighbors still held captive in Gaza's warren of tunnels?

We need to be honest with ourselves -- so much has been lost since October 7:

- Not only were the lives of around 1,200 Israelis intentionally taken in the most savage manner;
- not only were close to 240 kidnapped dragged away whether kicking or dead;
- not only are thousands still internally displaced from their homes in the south and the north of Israel because of ongoing daily barrages of rocket attacks from Gaza and Lebanon (not to mention recent explosions sent all the way from Iran);

But on that day last fall, Israelis lost their sense of military invincibility. That well known Israeli bravado

and confidence that their Defense Force is always on high alert and ready to respond at a moment's notice, will take a long time to recapture.

In the meantime, the good news is that Israel has never had an ally as committed to its successful future as the United States. On May 13, National Security Advisor Jake Sullivan stated: "No president has stood stronger with Israel than Joe Biden. He was the first president to visit Israel in wartime. He is protecting Israel at the UN. He mobilized a coalition to directly defend Israel against an Iranian attack. He led the bipartisan effort to pass a supplemental that ensures Israel's defense and military edge for years to come."

"His commitment to Israel is ironclad. Ironclad doesn't mean you never disagree; it means you work through your disagreements – as only a true friend can do. That's exactly what we have done for the past seven months – and that's what we will keep doing."

The other good news that Israel can receive, is us. The story that every recent visitor there repeats upon their return home, is how grateful Israelis are that we, world Jewry, are standing with them and standing up for them at this time.

At our Pesach seders just a few weeks ago, many of us might have concluded the evening by singing "B'Shanah haBa-ah biY'rushalayim" / "Next Year in Jerusalem".

If you want to be part of the good news happening for Israel this year, then do what you can to get there NOW!

It seems to me that the perspective of my Jewish identity at any moment is influenced by the Jewish history I learned over years. I have seen patterns of flourishing Jewish communities all over the world only to be set back or even decimated by evil forces that somehow finds that persecuting the Jews serves a purpose. This year the Passover story was told in the background of a war that has become complex politically and has caused divisions in our society. Wherever you stand, we are cognizant that civil discourse is more important than ever as information and misinformation swirl around us on social media and other media outlets. I hope that each of us will find support through our family, friends and congregants. I thank Rabbi Silbert for providing insights and guidance through his sermons.

In addition to the efforts of our Rabbi, I want to thank several people for the volunteer work they do for temple. Our executive board includes Toby Berke (VP Admin), who has been instrumental in keeping our office functioning while we search for a new office manager. David Langmann (VP Finance) has been working behind the scenes to keep us financially intact. - Safe Haven Holocaust Refugee Shelter
 Museum in Oswego, NY on July 14 and

The museum documents and keeps alive the stories of the 982 refugees from World War II who were allowed into the United States as "guests" of President Franklin D. Roosevelt. These refugees were housed at Fort Ontario in Oswego, NY, from August 1944 until February 1946. More info on signing up to follow.
- The 7th Annual Joint Golf Outing will be on July 29 at Wild Wood Country Club in Rush, NY. This is a new venue for the golf outing, which includes breakfast, an 18-hole round of golf with lunch, and after-golf hors d'oeuvres.
