From Rabbi Michael Silbert

Recently someone told me that her birthday is on September 12th. When her grandson became old enough to put the pieces together and realized this is



one day after the infamous September 11th, he said to her with great alarm: "Grandma! That's just one day after 9/11! What would have happened if your birthday was just one day earlier?!"

Grandma replied wisely, "Well, then my birthday would have been on the 11th" and she punctuated the sentence in fluent Yiddish by giving a shrug of the shoulders and opened her hands to him, which in English, roughly translates into: "*Nu? So what do you want me to do about it?*"

This seemed like the perfect Jewish response to me: "There's *tzorres (trouble) in the world, but what should I do? Sit at home and put my life on hold until the strife is over? There's always going to be something, so I might as well do the best I can to enjoy life and make sure that difficult situations don't get the better of me."*

All that in a shrug!

This kind of thinking is what I call "realistic optimism": when times are tough, let's be honest about it and acknowledge it, while at the same time continue to look for what Leonard Cohen called the "crack", the "crack in everything / that's how the light gets in." We need to let the light in, especially when times are darkest of all.

I offer this to you as a preamble to saying that the Jewish New Year will soon be with us, marking the

end of a year of terror and horror for the Jewish people. Almost a whole year ago on Simchat Torah, October 7, 2023, the final day of the Jewish High Holy Day season, the largest number of Jews were killed in a single day since the Holocaust. Hundreds more were dragged away into captivity, some molested, some dismembered, some even lifeless. In the year that's followed, antisemitism has been experienced in every single Jewish community on earth, at levels not seen or imagined since World War II. Now, as colleges return for their fall semesters, we wait with uncertainty for the next volley, the next layer of assault on Jewish life, dignity, rights and equality.

With such a dark cloud hanging over us, how are we supposed to be excited and hopeful about the celebrations and New Year which lie ahead?

I think we need to take a page out of my friend's book i.e. the friend whose birthday is within a hair's breadth of 9/11, by which I mean: we can either be controlled and defined by the circumstances, or we can take control of our own circumstances and choose to define ourselves.

Similar to the conundrum of the rapidly approaching High Holy Day season, a few months ago in the spring I was concerned about how the joyous festival of Purim would feel this year for the Jewish people. In my anticipation of that event, I looked for extreme analogies, going so far as to search for articles, reports and testimonies about how Purim was received and celebrated during the Holocaust. The little I was able to find described how this ancient celebration often served as an inspiration for Jews in *(Continued on page 9)*

I am also happy to announce that we have ordered and received a pair of Torah stands for the chapel in time for the high holidays. These pieces of temple furniture were produced by a company in the Golan Heights, Israel, Bass Synagogue Furniture. **Stan and Elaine Schaffer** have kindly donated these Torah stands. Thank you Stan and Elaine!



This year our High Holiday services will be at Temple Beth El in the chapel we use for weekly Shabbat services. This change was made because, logistically, there was a heavy lift for a small group of congregants needed to transport *Machzorim* and Torahs to Temple Sinai. There should be ample parking in the newly sealed and lined TBE parking lot. If you have a concern about space limitation or infection, we will have masks and hand sanitizer available at the door. Also note that in order to minimize disturbances during the services, entry to the chapel will be through the doors just down the hallway from our regular entry doors. There will also be a table outside the chapel to place your personal belongings.

the ghettos, encouraging them with this ancient tale of Jewish victory over malevolent persecutors who dabbled with genocidal plots.

By extension, I invite you to look with me at Rosh Hashanah this year with a sense of eager anticipation, a moment of joy that celebrates both our survival thus far and also the opportunities that lie ahead, *despite what we have recently endured. Instead of feeling too worn out – even too cynical – as Jews to celebrate, let's welcome this "crack"; this "crack in everything", because "that's how the light gets in." How fortunate are we to merit this opportunity to start over.*

My very best wishes to you and all your loved ones for a Shanah Tovah – for a very happy year indeed, filled with blessings of joy, good health, peace and fulfillment,
