Last spring, Israel was newly gripped by their Prime Minister's attempt to radically reshape the country's judicial system in his own image and interests. Hundreds of thousands of citizens were starting to participate in all manner of public protests. These events inspired the publication of "The Freedom Haggadah: A Story of Protest and Hope", written by reputable Israeli thought leaders and made available for free download from the internet. I learned about it from my niece who lives in Israel, just a couple hours before sunset on Erev Pesach and rushed to print as many copies as time and printer ink would allow, for the first seder which was rapidly approaching.

How times have changed. That issue, which threatened to transform Israel like nothing before and which might very well have resulted in the downfall of Netanyahu's government had the situation been allowed to run its course, was abruptly shelved on October 7 th , when Hamas launched its massacre in southern Israel. If you weren't aware of Israel's judicial crisis when Pesach rolled around in 2023, then you wouldn't have approached the seders with any sense of irony that on this festival of freedom, a majority of Israelis were living with the fear that many of their liberties were about to be taken from them by their own Jewish leaders.

In 2024 as we approach Pesach once again, Israel faces a very different crisis – one you've probably heard about. Jews around the world will sit at the seder table this year and it's hard to conceive of there being a single gathering where reference to Israel's current state of affairs will not be made. If last year was any predictor of what might follow, this year, too, there is a special, timely Haggadah which can either be used as a full primary source or as a collection of commentaries to provide inspiration for seder discussions. "Seder Interrupted: A Post October 7 Haggadah Supplement", edited by Dr. Ora

Horn Prouser and Rabbi Menachem Creditor, is available for purchase from Amazon.com or free download from https://ajr.edu/forms/haggadah-supplement-download.

During the "good years" when Israel has not been at war and especially since Jews were free to leave Russia, Jews around the world have celebrated Pesach in the luxury of knowing that things have been going pretty well for our people – here in the US, in Israel, and most other places. With the possible exception of the small number of Jews still living in Iran, we could sing familiar songs about liberation and eat foods that symbolize the misery of slavery and captivity, secure in the knowledge that those times were largely behind us.

So, why is this year different from all other years? Because that sense of our people's security is vanishing. The situation in Israel notwithstanding; if global antisemitism could somehow be monetized, stockholders would be rolling in their 2024 dividend payouts.

In my mental images of Pesachs past, I can still see my late Zeide actually trying to get comfortable in his seat at the head of the table, what with two plump pillows stuffed between him and the backrest. They were used to put into practice the injunction to eat in a reclining position on Pesach ("balailah hazeh kulanu mesubin" – on this night, we all eat while reclining) symbolic of our freedom since being emancipated from Egypt.

Well, it turns out that Egypt was but the first in a series of liberations throughout Jewish history that have inspired our vacillating sense of comfort. This year though, we have taken at least a few steps backwards and if it's not we who have regressed, then it's the situation we find ourselves in. And if

Lilly Sherman

Interviewed by Bev Zwick

I had the honor of spending time with **Lilly Sherman** and finding out a bit about this amazing woman's life. She was born in Czechoslovakia in 1926. She was one of 13 siblings; five girls and eight boys. Tragically, at the age of 14, she and her parents and all but three of her siblings were taken by the Nazis to Auschwitz; one sister and one brother managed to get to Italy, and another sister hid successfully in Czechoslovakia.

Lilly survived Auschwitz — the rest of her family was murdered there. After liberation Lilly's strength and determination took her to Germany to a recuperation camp where she met, fell in love and married Frank. They spent five years in Germany, and in 1948, their first son Solomon was born.

After two failed attempts to go to Israel (they were actually on a boat and forced back to Germany) Lilly, Frank and Solomon immigrated to America and landed in Reading, Pennsylvania with help from the Jewish Federation. It was there, in 1952, that their daughter, Susan, was born. About a year after that, the young family made their way to Rochester where they lived in a tiny apartment on Thomas Street and where their third child, Steven, was born.

Again with strength, determination, and some luck, the family was able to purchase a house on Belcoda Drive in Irondequoit where Lilly still lives today. Life was not easy, however, for the Shermans. The house was in very bad shape and needed a lot of work.

Lilly worked the 3 to 11 p.m. shift at Sibley Tower for two years to help support the family and then continued to work at Bausch and Lomb for 10 years, still on the 3 to 11 p.m. shift. She would get her kids ready for school in the morning, then prepare dinner before leaving for work that afternoon. The neighbors on her street were very helpful and watched out for the kids until Frank came home from work. After 10 more years of this difficult schedule, Lilly, with help from a



neighbor, got a job at Kodak (the only Jew in her department). She finally was assigned to the day shift and worked there for 26 years.

It's clearly evident that Lilly was and still is a strong and determined woman and, although life was not easy, she raised a beautiful family with her husband, Frank.

She now has two granddaughters and three greatgrandchildren who reside in Buffalo. When I asked her son Steve (present at the interview) about a favorite recipe that his mom made, he responded immediately "cholant"!

Lilly and Frank were early members of Temple Beth David. Lilly fondly remembers making 200 honey cakes to raise money for the synagogue.

We, as a congregation, are honored and blessed to have **Lilly Sherman** as part of our community.





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

that's still a little too obtuse or unnecessarily euphemistic, then allow me to propose that it's the Jews-haters who have receded from the many years of progress that's been made – the antisemites who seek to Make Antisemitism Great Again.

I believe that this year our seders ought to have something of a cloud hanging over them. For years now, their tone has been largely celebratory; this year many of us will return thematically to "aspirational". Not just the ritual recitation of "Next year in Jerusalem" which reminds us to aspire, but real, actual aspirations of once again living in times when others' hatred of us just because we are born Jewish becomes more of an unpleasant memory than a rising current concern. How bitter the irony that especially on this festival when we banish all that rises, tossing out antisemitism from our midst is beyond our reach. Indeed, rising antisemitism is the

chametz (leaven) which should be spurned not just by Jews, but by everyone; and not just on Pesach, but at all times.

The openings for hope and light lie in the opportunity for us to engage in these discussions around the Pesach seder table this year. Seize the opportunity. Instead of retreating from difficult topics or abstaining outright from any type of observance of the festival, take part in Jewish life. Seek the inspiration to find your place in the arc of our people's history and allow yourself to recommit to our future and our freedom. And as always: not just for ourselves, but for all.
