"Bikkur Cholim: Sharing the Burden of Illness

"Pleasant words are like a honeycomb, sweet to the palate and a cure for the body." Proverbs 16:24

"What are the doctors saying?" "How are you doing with all of this?"

When you read these words, are you hearing them or saying them to another person? Are you hurting -- feeling alone -- and would welcome a visit from a friend in our congregation? Are you inspired to do a *mitzvah* by learning the art of *bikkur cholim* -- sharing the pain, fear or frightening powerlessness inherent in human vulnerability?

A few weeks ago we read that after the 99-year old Abraham circumcised himself, God appeared to Abraham, while he was recuperating from his procedure, sitting at the entrance of his tent on a very hot day. The Torah doesn't say whether or not God brought Abraham a card, a cooling foot bath or even a bottle of Tylenol. All we know is that God made Abraham aware of God's presence. In one small verse in the Torah, God models the elevated behavior of *bikkur cholim* -- visiting friends, family members, and members of our community who are sick and tending to their needs.

Rabbi Tsvi Blanchard teaches in *Joining Heaven and Earth: Maimonides and the Laws of Bikkur Cholim*, "Visiting the sick

is a moment which unites human generosity with the nurturing Divine Presence." By offering our human presence and praying for God's healing, we invite God's presence into the moment. By confronting another person's illness and praying for his or her recovery, we also deepen our awareness of an aspect of our own vulnerable selves.

When a visitor or a caller reminds us that we are loved and that the people around us care about us, our pain or discomfort is lifted for a little while. The Talmud (*Nedarim* 39b) teaches "one who visits removes one sixtieth of a stricken one's illness." Moreover, *bikkur cholim* has no limits. Younger people may visit older people and vice versa. (*Nedarim* 39a). This *mitzvah* can help our children remain aware of the welfare of people all around us and to maintain their innate compassion.

At some point in our lives, we will be brought face to face with another person through our psychical, emotional and spiritual vulnerabilities. Learning to support one another through shared understanding will enable us to bring the divine into our human interactions.

If everyone in our community makes just one new connection and follows up with a regular call or visit or card, we can

President's Article: Light

Hanukkah is nearly here, and the festival of light is about to be ushered in. We celebrate the miracle of a small cruse of oil lasting a lengthy eight days, and the victory of the outnumbered Jews over the powerful Greek army.

So many of our holidays are welcomed in with light. On Shabbat eve, the Shabbat candles are kindled first. At the end of Shabbat, a candle is lit and then extinguished to first celebrate and then signal the end of this special light and the beginning of the secular week.

Light is key to Judaism in other ways. The Jewish people are to be a holy people, a light unto the nations. In the priestly blessing, we ask G-d to shine His light upon us and give us peace. Even in everyday speech, we say when someone has passed away that a light has left this world.

So what is light?

In Judaism, we read that we are created in the image of G-d, that there is a divine spark inside each of us. In Kabbalistic thought, we are to release the light that is encased in what only appears as darkness by making ourselves purer in thought and deed.

I believe that it is our job to overcome our ego and let that divine spark shine through us. Our ego is what tells us to lash out at someone when hurt, to defend oneself at all cost, to be "better" than someone else, to put down others, to judge others, and so on, and so on. I believe it is our job ever so slowly, with hard work, to gain increasing mastery and release our ego bit by bit and let the divine spark show itself bit by bit. That means to restrain yourself before you get angry or act self-righteously. It means to understand yourself and the workings of your ego and to dis-attach yourself from its hold. I read recently that cats do not have issues with self-esteem nor do dogs

act judgmentally with their peers. This is a human challenge to master and release one's ego and let the inner soul inform one's actions. This, I believe, unbinds the light within the apparent darkness within ourselves and our world. It is what can usher in our being a light unto the nations.

It is not our culture's worldview to act first in compassionate, caring, selfless ways. Rather, our culture tells us to look out for number one, to become number one, to gain wealth, fame, power, and possessions. Our tradition tells us something different. On Hanukkah we celebrate the miraculous light we can find within if we only seek it. Let us rededicate ourselves, as is customary on Hanukkah, to be the most hamische, welcoming, caring, supportive, and thoughtful community of individuals we can be.

News from IHSC

I have just returned from Israel. The trip is so recent that I am still comparing—the colors that I see around me, the smell of the air, and the sound of the language I hear. I was privileged to be part of the Federation's educators' delegation to Modi'in, Israel this year. The trip was part of the Federation's ongoing Partnership 2000 initiative that links Rochester with the (new) city of Modi'in. Each year educators from the 2 communities travel back and forth, getting to know the countries and learning about what it means to be Jewish in a different setting. Between visits the communications continue via email and snail mail. And over time, the sense of community between the 2 communities grows.

What does this mean for our children? Over the past couple of years our children have received snack foods for Purim, dreidels for Hanu-

kah, beautiful bookmarks featuring Israeli flowers, books describing classes of Israeli children and letters from children in our match schools -- Dorot and Amit. We have sent Rosh HaShana cards, American dreidels, letters, pictures of ourselves and pictures of our trees at Tu B'shevat with snow on their branches. This year we are hoping to share more information about how holidays are celebrated in the 2 communities, songs, family stories, and homemade games. It is my hope that this project will continue to enrich us all and will widen the conversation about what it means to be Jewish.

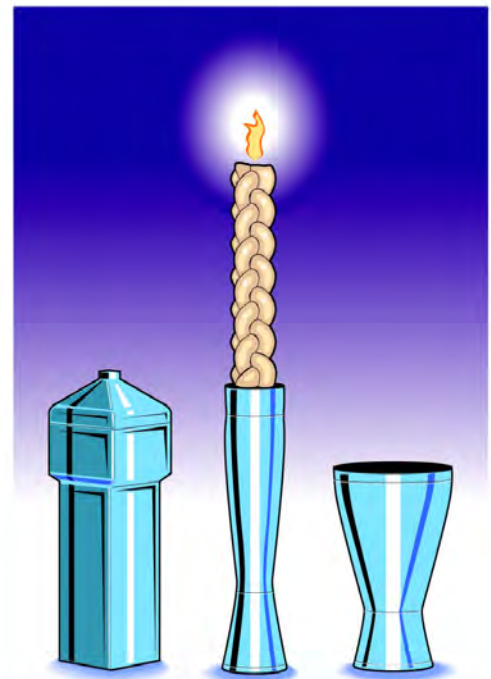

JEWISH IRAQ WAR VETERAN VISITS TEMPLE BETH DAVID

Temple Beth David played host to a special guest, a Jewish Iraq War veteran, this past Labor Day Weekend. **Sgt. Marci Nemtzow**, a member U.S. Army's Tenth Mountain Division, is a veteran of both the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. While serving in Iraq she was the lay leader for Jewish service members in her unit. Sgt. Nemtzow visited Temple Beth David to thank its members for the service projects which benefited her and other Jews serving in the military overseas.

Sgt. Nemtzow attended Shabbat services on Friday evening and Saturday. After the Saturday morning service she answered questions from the congregation about her experiences as a Jew serving in two wars. The service was followed by a special kiddish in her honor. Sgt. Nemtzow expressed her gratitude to the congregation for their support of Jewish soldiers. In particular, she noted that had the Temple not sent her a Pesach care package she would have had no kosher foods to observe the holiday with.

Over the past year, Sgt. Nemtzow received several care packages to help her fellow Jewish soldiers celebrate the Jewish holidays. Among these packages were: cookies, gelt and cards by school-children for Hanukkah; dozens of Haman-



taschen for Purim and Matzos and other delicacies for Pesach. The care package projects have been a joint effort between Temple Beth David and the Irondequoit Hebrew Studies Center coordinated by Temple Beth David member Keith Freedman.

Shortly after her visit, Sgt. Nemtzow was reassigned to Fort Rucker in Alabama. The Temple hopes to continue to work with her and to "adopt" the small Jewish community located at her new base.

Presently, the Temple and the Irondequoit Hebrew Studies Center are collecting Hanukkah cards to be sent to Jewish

soldiers serving both overseas (in Iraq, Afghanistan and Korea) as well as those who continue to service our nation back in the United States. Anyone interested in sending Hanukkah cards may drop them off at the Temple Beth David office by Wed. 11/25/2009.
