"The Joy of Mitzvot"

Why do we observe mitzvot? As American Jews, we live in an unprecedented time of religious, social, and intellectual freedom. What are some of the reasons we may choose to take upon ourselves the "yoke of mitzvot?" Although I can only speak for myself in this article, I would love to hear from you – about your desires, your struggles, and your thoughts about mitzvot.

As for me, the quality of love motivates me to observe mitzvot. I do not know whether love of God precedes human love or vice versa. Maybe in human consciousness, each type of love is infused with the other. In my practice of mitzvot, sometimes the mitzvah itself attunes me to the needs of others. Sometimes the "recipient" of a mitzvah instructs me by their reaction as to how I can better relate to him or her. The "what to do" as well as the "how to do it" of halakhah (Jewish law) is deeply informed by my asking, "What would The Compassionate One do?" as well as. "How do I approach this particular person?" In general, my personal relationships are positively affected by my observance, which, in turn, motivates me to continue learning and improving my observance.

Learning halakhah in the service of observing mitzvot gives me more joy than any learning I have ever undertaken.

Even though an extra financial burden and almost certainly an increased time commitment often accompanies the observance of mitzvot, it seems as though life becomes not only more meaningful, but, on a certain level, easier. I experience both a comfort and an increased vitality through mitzvot.

I have had the opportunity to think about how I would answer challenges to my reason(s) for observing mitzvot. An atheist might say: "The belief in God, like love, is a projection or a delusion for the sake of psychological comfort or a pathetic attempt to control nature." A variation on this theme might be "there is no God" or "God is dead."

I understand this point of view and love may be a delusion or it may be a lens through which to understand the world. Artists often see the world in a different light or with a different emphasis. The fictional Don Quixote was, in fact, delusional. Wanting the world to be more chivalrous, safe and just, he directed his efforts toward making it that way. Although the ultimately disillusioned Don may have miscalculated his own abilities as well as the strength of the resistance of the world he lived in to such an attitude, wasn't the world made better because Cervantes bequeathed this delusional character to our collective con-

President's Article: Being Open

As you receive this bulletin, it is October. The leaves are probably starting to turn. School by now has been underway some 3 to 4 weeks. At synagogue we have had the High Holidays and are celebrating Sukkot.

So, let's think about the sukkah for a moment. The structure can be made from a variety of materials, often cleverly put together. All types of walls, fasteners, and decorations are used. There is a requirement that the ceiling allow you to see the stars above. What this means is that there is an openness to the structure of the sukkah.

Tradition has it that on Sukkot we have a temporary structure with an open top to signify the moveable structures the Jewish people used wandering in the desert (of course, had they only had a GPS back then, they might have wandered less). In addition, tradition says that the temporariness of the structure points to the Jewish people's dependence on G-d.

What does that openness of the top of the sukkah connote? I think it can refer

to the occupant experiencing an openness that he/she may not be used to in the usual home one lives in. There is an 'exposure', perhaps representing an exposure to new ideas and an increased openness to receive these ideas.

Perhaps also accompanying this exposure is a certain vulnerability people feel when they open themselves up - not just to the elements but to new ideas. Can we learn from this experience of being in an open-topped sukkah something about being open to new ideas at Temple Beth David?

We have come through a time of uncertainty as we lost our beloved Rabbi Skopitz, took on our interim Rabbi Goldberg, and have now engaged our new permanent rabbi, Rabbi Berg. We are now confronted with where to go from here.

Do we set a direction for our temple for the near-term? Are we willing to be open to new ideas as we engage in setting that direction. Time will tell. In the meanwhile, I encourage everyone to 'risk' being open to new possibilities from those we've experienced before – possibilities that build on our strengths while reaching for greater spiritual and human connection, aliveness of activities, deeper involvement, and personal as well as quantitative growth.

I would urge congregants to 'look through to the stars' and imagine meaningful additions to how we worship, start a long-wanted social action project, create an activity they themselves want to engage in, introduce new learning and teaching, and incorporate their families into personally relevant forms of Jewish and spiritual life.

Let us draw a lesson from the sukkah. Let us risk the vulnerability of being open to possibilities, work to materialize them, and thereby strengthen this temporary structure called life. Isn't it ironic that by being vulnerable we in fact create the deep connections with each other and with G-d that in the long run give us security and inner strength. So let us be open and let the magic happen.

An historian might say: "Religion has caused more war and death than any other ideology!" I also understand this perspective, and with the rise in fundamentalism in many parts of the world, this reasoning seems cogent. Religion has, at times, been the cause of tragic wars. However, in my humble opinion, institutions of higher education often mistakenly place the blame for wars on religious fanaticism, when, in actuality, the root cause has been the abuse of power, greed, the exploitation of people and national resources or nationalism. Whether or not focusing the blame for war on religion is a secular belief or an

anti-religion bias needs to be explored further. The Divine/human religious impulse has probably done more good for more people, by providing hope, teaching ethics and morality and, where needed, collectively responding to human need resulting from natural or human disaster.

A scientist might say: "The world operates according to scientific principles not God's will." To this, I say: the observance of mitzvot produces a kind of energy -- an energy of kindness. Possibly mitzvot, like philosophy, represent a way to impose order on chaos. I would assert that just as science has discovered that the act of observing an object can

subtly affect that object, so too observing mitzvot through directing good intention and targeted positive action into the heart of a person or a declining ecosystem can subtly affect the course of humankind and our world.

Perhaps answering the question, "Why do we observe mitzvot?" with the question, "why do we not?" is a better question to ponder as we consider how we can best express and experience our freedom.



Sukkot, one of the three major festivals. begins on the evening of October 2nd. Sukkot --Z'man Simchateinu (the time of our joy) -- is associated with many wonderful traditions, and we encourage you to spend some meaningful time in a Sukkah (possibly with family and/or fellow congregants), along with shaking the lulov. Indeed, it is a mitzvah to invite people to your Sukkah and to accept an invitation to sit in someone else's Sukkah. There is precious little that reminds us of the fragility of life while, at the same time, causing us to feel at peace and grateful for our old friends as well as new friends we have

just met in a welcoming Sukkah.
Each one of the first and second days of Sukkot is on the weekend (October 3rd and 4th) and while our celebration of the Festival is slightly curtailed on the first day (because of Shabbat), we'll parade around the main sanctuary on the second day, chanting the Hoshanot and shaking lulavim as we go. Also, weather permitting, we'll have special kiddushim in Temple Beth David's Sukkah (decorated by the Irondequoit Hebrew Studies Center students and members of our Temple community) on both the first and second days.

Shemini Atzeret (including a Yizkor service) falls on a Shabbat (October 10th); and that evening Simchat Torah will be celebrated in its full glory. Come to Temple Beth David on either the evening of October 10th (starting at 7:30 PM) and/or the morning of October 11th (starting at 9:00 AM) for a grand celebration of the Torah (with lots of great singing [Hakafot is really special with Sam] and dancing). Note, anyone attending on October 11th is entitled to an aliyah, and an aliyah is provided for all the children in attendance.


Mazel Tov, B'Nai Mitzvah!




